

AMERICANS CAPTURE MORE RACES

ARE SO FAR IN THE LEAD NOW THAT NOTHING CAN STOP THEM—EXPECT TO CAPTURE THE BIG MARATHON RACE.

Stockholm, July 13.—Confident that they can beat all other men in the marathon, the great event of the present Olympic meeting, which will be run tomorrow, the American entrants and managers admitted today that they could probably not hold Kolehmainen, the wonderful Finnish distance runner. Any accident to this great athlete, the Americans agreed, probably would be followed by an American triumph in the classic. However, there is nothing but admiration for him in the American camp, and if he is first he will be cheered by no one more warmly than by the representatives of the Stars and Stripes.

Johnny Hayes, winner of the London marathon, and in charge today of the Americans who will start in tomorrow's heart-breaking race, said this afternoon that he was hopeful of the outcome. His men have done nothing but rest and take limbering up walks since Wednesday, and are in the pink of condition. But Hayes admitted that he expected the great Finn would be the winner.

The big feature of today's card, the classic 440-meter dash, was a real race from pistol crack to the tape, and resulted in a victory for the American, Reidpath, of Syracuse, but he had to hang up a new record to defeat Hans Braun, the best sprinter on the continent.

There was interest today in the Decathlon, the all-around event, which started with a 100-meter dash. It includes this run, a running broad jump, putting the weight, best hand running high jump, 400-meter hurdles, throwing the discus, pole vault, throwing the javelin and a 1500-meter flat race.

The 100-meter sprint was contested by 29 athletes. Of the Americans, James Thorpe, of Carlisle; Eugene L. Mercer, University of Pennsylvania, and Harry S. Babcock, of Columbia, won their heats. James J. Donoghue, of Los Angeles, got a second, and George Philbrooke, of Notre Dame, landed a third. L. F. Lukeman, a Canadian, won his heat.

The United States runners won first place in the 3000-meter race, one of the most dramatic contests of the games. Sweden was second and England third.

Platt Adams, New York A. C., won the standing high jump final at five feet, 3 inches. Benjamin Adams, New York A. C., was second, and Teichtman, of Greece, third.

In the finals of the discus throw, both hands, Tapale, of Finland, was first with a throw of 71 feet 8 inches; Eklander, of Finland, second, and Magnusson, Sweden, third.

MRS. OLDS IS NOT GUILTY SAYS JURY

Spokane, Wash., July 13.—After being out nearly 19 hours a jury today returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of Mrs. Della Olds, young and pretty widow of Dr. W. H. Olds, a pioneer physician of Spokane, whom she shot in their home here a few weeks ago.

The verdict was received with

cheers by a crowded court room. Mrs. Olds, when she heard the verdict, collapsed and screaming fell to the floor. Her sister, Mrs. Frankie Yoon, who was sitting beside the defendant, also collapsed and fell over on Mrs. Olds. F. C. Robertson, counsel for the defense, assisted Mrs. Olds to her feet. There was much confusion in the court room, and it was some time before order was restored.

A PERPLEXING PROBLEM.

To can or not to can—that is the question. Whether 'tis wiser in the mind of the housewife to pickle, to preserve, to can, or to spend her time upon the piazza, magazine in hand and buy canned goods from the nearest grocery? The question is ably discussed in a recent issue of Farm and Home. A New England housekeeper writes:

I greatly deplore the tendency of the modern housewife to feed her family on boughs "canned stuff," instead of doing her own canning, preserving and pickling as her mother and grandmothers used to do. It seems to me not only an unthrifty way, but one actually deleterious to the health of the family, for in spite of the pure food laws we know that much stuff that is not good or healthful finds its way into cans, and for which we must pay a high price.

The farmer should, wherever possible, produce what he consumes, and sell the surplus to best advantage. The stuff from garden and orchard, canned at home, generally finds a ready nearby market, and obviates the necessity of selling such products when they are fresh at a season when the market is glutted and prices way down. Many housewives, with the aid of members of the family, can and sell fruits and vegetables at a nice profit.

The other side in this explained by a Kansas housewife: Does it pay? Is it worth while to cook and can all the hot summer, so that we may feast during the winter? The time was when much of the canned goods offered for sale was of a poor quality, but since we have the pure food law we can tell much better what we are buying. Last year late blackberries, peaches and roasting ears all needed to be canned for the winter. The fruit I felt that I must take care of, but the roasting ears were sent to market and exchanged for canned corn. No one made any objection when it was brought to the table, so probably I will follow the same practice again this year. One year I did the same with tomatoes. When they ripened other work was on hand, and as the tomatoes would not keep I sent them to the store and was sent canned ones instead. When buying, it is wise to buy a good grade of anything—the cheapest is often the dearest.

HANFORDS RECEIVERS GROW RICH

Seattle, Wash., July 13.—Two of the Hanford receivers, who drew enormous fees, and which alleged to have shown favoritism on the part of Judge Hanford, and abuse of judicial discretion, were called by the congressional investigation committee this morning. They were James A. Kerr, of the local firm of Kerr & McCord, receiver for the Pacific Packing & Navigation company and the Pacific American Packing company and Sutcliffe Baxter, who at present is one of the receivers of the Western Steel corporation, who has already got \$40,000 in fees out of this case.

In answer to Representative McCoy, Baxter testified that he had no profession, that he was not a lawyer, and that he has had seven receiverships from Judge Hanford in the past four or five years.

Baxter could not give the exact dates and detailed facts in connection with the receiverships which he held, and was excused to prepare the data by next Tuesday or Wednesday.

Kerr was appointed receiver for the packing companies by Judge Hanford March, 1908. In that connection Judge Hanford is charged with allowing Kerr, as receiver, and the firm of Kerr & McCord, as attorneys for the receiver, the excessive fee of \$150,000.

From the beginning of Kerr's testimony, he clashed with Representative McCoy, when the latter insisted upon finding out what steps Kerr had taken to ascertain if the capital stock in the companies had been paid up.

Kerr said he did not get the treasury book from its custodian in New Jersey, and so never proceeded to make stock subscribers pay up.

Kerr, it developed, was attorney for the two companies up to the time of their failure. When McCoy insisted in questioning Kerr what actual steps he had taken, according to the laws of New Jersey, to get the treasury book, Kerr got mad and said that he had been "pressed far enough" in that direction.

The witness was given to understand by Chairman Graham that he was not to decide what questions are to be asked of him. Kerr said that he could not recollect that he consulted his attorney and partner, McCord, about the matter.

Kerr's examination was continued this afternoon.
