CONFESSES TO SMUGGLING

IN 10,000 CHINESE

Los Angeles, Cal., July 12.—According to federal officials here, Billy Gerald, alleged smuggler of Chinese, has confessed and has divulged the name of the leader of a band of smugglers that has given the immigration authorities grave concern for more than a year.

According to Gerald's confession, more than 2000 Chinese have been smuggled into America through Southern California each year for half a decade. It was also intimated that well-known persons were connected with the work.

Gerald was captured early this week. Federal officers are patrolling the Catalina channel for other suspects.

BAPTISTS CRITICIZE THE ELKS

YOUNG PEOPLE'S CONVENTION
"VIEWS WITH ALARM THE RECKLESS AND UNPRECEDENTED REVELRY AND DRUNKENNESS"
—COHEN COMES TO DEFENSE.

Portland, Ore., July 13.—The Baptist Young People's Union Pacific Coast convention, now in session here, today is on record with a resolution in which severe criticism is made of the conduct of the Elks during the annual reunion of that order in Portland this week. The resolution, introduced by Dr. Charles A. Cook, of Spokane, and passed unanimously by the convention, is:

"Resolved, That, while recognizing much in the purposes and aims of the great fraternal and benevolent organizations of the country as worthy of our hearty commendation, we view with alarm the reckless and unprecedented revelry and drunkenness accompanying the B. P. O. Elks' convention and celebration in this city, and as a convention of Baptist Young People, representing nine Pacific coast states, we most earnestly protest against the authorities permitting what has been scarcely less than a veritable orgy of indecency and evil doing."

D. S. Cohen, publicity commissioner and member of the executive board of the Portland lodge B. P. O. E., commenting on the resolution, said:

"If the church which these people represent was as careful of the foundation of morality of the membership as the order they so ignorantly denounce their places of worship might possibly be as well and consistently attended as are the meetings of all the lodges of Elks throughout the United States, and their influence upon the community be as valuable for good."

TRAIN KILLS SALEM MAN AT MEDFORD

Medford, Ore., July 13.—Leroy Carden, 23 years of age, whose home is believed to be in Salem, was run down and killed by train No. 13, near Gold Hill, Friday night. The young man was returning to Gold Hill along the Southern Pacific track from a fishing expedition when the tragedy occurred. The young man, according to the engineer of the train, was first seen when the train rounded a curve. He was about 150 feet ahead of the train, and turned and looked at it. He then continued on his way down the track, the train overtaking and killing him. He apparently made no effort to get off the track.

The young man was identified by a fishing license issued at Salem. An inquest will be held Sunday afternoon.

KANSAS MAN WRITES ABOUT CHERRY FAIR

F. A. Keefover has written the following letter of date of Salem, July 12, to his home paper, the Times, at Blue Rapids, Kansas:

"Dear Sir: I am just home from an inspection of the fruit display at the Salem Cherry Fair. Now, to the average Kansan, used to regarding wheat and corn as the crops that produce a bank account, cherries seem a mighty small thing to use as a headline for a fair. He hasn't become acquainted with the cherry industry. He has known cherries only as a very edible fruit that is likely to be killed by the March or April freeze in Kansas. Whenever one comes to understand that an acre of cherries will stuff the pocketbook a good many times tighter than several acres of the best Blue river corn in a good year, he begins to get interested. Also, while the Lord hasn't guaranteed a full crop of anything for every year (to keep us from becoming too rich and sinful, I suppose), He has smiled on cherries and all other crops in the Willamette valley, along the west end of Oregon, in the way of an equable climate and no drouths or storms, not to mention a producing soil that goes down further than the shallowest post augurs they make in Illinois.

"The one who can't become interested in cherries simply never has seen the exhibit at our Cherry Fair.

"Mr. Staley, remembers cherries out Little Blue way and I were inspecting the fruit together, and fell to talking about the faint conception we ever had of real cherries, from the ones we used to pick half ripe and get the stomachache from along about the knee-pants period. Old habits stick, and I accounted for a big dish of Lamberts the other evening, but my stomach didn't act the least bit surprised.

"It has taken nearly a year for Mrs. Keefover and me to get out of our mind the impression of hogs, corn, wheat and crop failures always imminent. But we are becoming westernized. Cherries are only one of the products that make ten acres furnish a living for an ordinary family, providing the farmer uses intelligence and the same hustle he would expect to use elsewhere.

"We left Blue Rapids while Messrs. Axtell and Loomis and their companions were inspecting the south end of this valley, where fruit land in bearing is producing a good income on an investment of a thousand dollars or more an acre. Much of the best rolls for more. According to my memory of the reports sent back, they were enthusiastic over the country. Just as good land for fruit, and adapted to many kinds, as well as to general crops, can be had within a few miles of Salem for prices around a hundred. This section has never been boomed. It has the possibilities, nature has been lavish, and the people are just awakening to the possibilities of its greatest development. That makes it the time and the place for investigation by the wise investor or farmer. In income, the full possibilities of an acre here are probably five to ten times that of an average Missouri valley acre.

"Last year we spent in the orange belt of Southern California, in the center of the walnut district. Walnut land there, in full bearing, sells for from \$800 to \$1600 an acre, among those who understand the industry. Acre for acre, it produces about the same income as an acre of fruit land here in the same state of bearing. But, while one waits for about seven or eight years for a crop of walnuts, half that wait is all that is required for loganberries that pay as well or better. And there are so many other things one can raise here during the development of an orchard.

"In California nature did little. She quit short. The water was about as neglected in making the country as it is at a bartenders' convention. It is scarce, and it comes high and often with a fight. There nature did little and man did most of it. Here nature has been lavish, and man is just beginning to do his part in realization of what lies in the soil and climate. Our winters are just cool enough to give snap and vigor; two days the mercury

went to 88, and the rest of the time I have had to walk fast to acquire a sweat. We have plenty of rain, especially in the winter, but it is in the form of a light mist, and a real down-pour is rare.

Our old friends there will be interested in knowing both of us are well; also that attenuated yellow dog (we still insist he is an Italian hound) that most people in Blue Rapids know, is still with us and as prone to bark nights on the west edge of the continent as he was near the central part. In fact, he is a little more prone, owing, no doubt, to a mellow atmosphere with moisture that prevents sore throat and gulps of dust on the intake at the ending of the prolonged diapason. We took him with us one day to the beach. Becoming thirsty, he ambled over to a quiet pool and took a few impulsive laps of the salty sea. The look of surprise, disgust and the malvolent gloom with which he faced us gave no room for guess as to his state of mind. If the language power had been given him that moment, his voiced opinion of us would have sounded like Henry and Johnson at the Chicago convention. He became subdued, penitent and evidently homesick for the public square water trough of Blue Rapids.

"While working for Mr. Staley in his school, I finished my law schooling in the university here, was graduated and passed the bar examination before the supreme court. I am still with the school and attending to practice that already coming from acquaintances made this past year; but if any of you Kansans should stroll along Salem's business streets within the next few months you will see a lawyer's shingle with my name on it. And don't forget to walk right in, no matter what your politics. You'll find me there—and Mrs. Keefover is a better cook, a more genial hostess than ever before, if possible. The best evidence of that is in the fact that I have gained 20 pounds in weight during our Oregon residence. We shall never cease to like Kansas, and those it holds.
