AERONAUT
KILLED AT
PALO ALTO

Palo Alto, Cal., July 12.—Victor Morris Smith, holder of the world's amateur airplane speed record, was killed here this afternoon.

Smith, who was a 26-year-old Stanford student, and was making an exhibition flight from Mountain View to Palo Alto when a gust of wind caught his machine. He plunged 75 feet to earth and was instantly killed.

Smith was a son of Victor Morris Smith, Sr., the millionaire president of the Western Meat company, of San Francisco.

Young Smith, who was in his second year of an engineering course at Stanford, started out today to make a flight in his 50-horse power Curtiss bi-plane from Mountain View to Palo Alto and was nearing the university town when the gust of wind tipped his machine. The boy plunged down and landed in a prune orchard, nearly every bone in his body being broken. He was dead when picked up by some of the 500 persons who witnessed his fall.

The machine was smashed to splinters.

The dead aeronaut was considered one of the most daring of any developed on the Pacific coast of late years. Recently he broke all amateur aviation speed records in a flight at San Diego.

Allison Found Guilty—The jury in the case of the state of Oregon against A. A. Allison for highway robbery committed in Salem, April 18, 1912, on a young man by the name of Chenoweth, returned a verdict of guilty as charged in the indictment.
