RUNAWAY TEAM LANDS IN A WELL

Pendleton, Or., July 19.—One of the most frightful accidents recorded in the county occurred at noon yesterday, when a team of mules driven by Henry Doan, a rancher on Little McKay creek, became unmanageable and ran away in the field where James Doan was operating a mower.

The mules ran into the mowing outfit, upsetting the machine and the team of horses drawing it started off at a mad gallop. Doan was thrown from his seat and dragged for a considerable distance, one wheel of the mower passing over his body. Having freed themselves from the mower and driver, the excited team dashed on until a deep open well was encountered and both animals plunged into the same.

Before aid could reach them the horses were dead. The injured man, James Doan, was rushed by automobile to the hospital, where it was found his hip was broken, and only by skilled surgical aid were two fingers on his left hand saved. A long scalp wound was also sustained, as well as severe body bruises and cuts.

Witnesses to the accident marvel that Doan was not killed outright when the wheel of the mower passed over him. That he escaped without being cut to pieces by the mower is considered marvelous. Physicians say he will recover.

GRADE TO HARRISBURG READY FOR THE RAILS

Harrisburg, Ore., July 19.—The Oregon Electric grade is now completed from Albany to this city and the large force of men and teams which have been at work in this vicinity for the past month have been moved south to points in Lane county. The track-laying crew of 150 men will again take up the work of laying steel within a few days from the point eight or nine miles south of Albany where work was stopped the first of the month to enable the crew to help put the finishing touches on the line into Albany so cars could begin operation on the Fourth.

Steel is laid at the rate of two miles a day, when the work is well under way, so that the line can be completed to Harrisburg in 10 days after resuming work. It is reported that the company will rush the work to this point in order to enable it to ship the steel and other bridge material for the big bridge across the Willamette at this point over its own track, and thus save heavy freight charges, which would otherwise go to its rival.

mill case and the Saitie, Renton & Southern case, in which Judge Hanford enjoined the Rainier valley people "from refusing to pay more than a five-cent fare."

He was followed by Howard D. Hughes, assistant corporation counsel. Hughes gave a brief review of the litigation in the Renton case. It was shown that Peabody-Houghteling company, of Chicago, bondholders of the Renton line, brought the injunction suit against the traction company, asking that the company be restrained from refusing to collect more than a nickel fare on its line. Judge Hanford granted this restraining order without notice to the city, which had been made a defendant in the suit.

Attorney E. S. McCord took the stand at noon today and denied the testimony of Frank Burpee, that he was told that unless he wanted to buy Hanford's invention, the judge had no time to show it to him.

MAKING IT WARM FOR HANFORD

Seattle, Wash., July 19.—Judge C. H. Hanford's speech against the Pinchot policies before the National Conservation congress in September, 1909 and testimony of attorneys in the Gill recall, and the Seattle, Renton and Southern injunction suits, featured this morning's session before the congressional probe committee.

The committee left the details of both these cases out of the oral testimony wherever the court documents covered the subject, indicating thereby an eagerness to finish up the taking of testimony tomorrow night.

Hanford's conservation speech was made an exhibit in connection with the testimony about the Hanford-irrigation company. In the testimony of George H. Plummer, western sales agent for the Northern Pacific railway, it was shown that the Hanford company obtained thousands of acres of land in Eastern Washington which the federal reclamation service desired held in reserve, if possible. The exhibit was allowed to go into the record as tending to show personal reasons for Judge Hanford's activity against the government reclamation department.

Walter Shaffner, attorney for Hiram Gill in the injunction suit to prevent the recall election in 1911, testified that Judge Hanford told him he did not want to stop the election, but merely to prevent unlawful expenditure of money. Shaffner was attorney for Frank H. Soobey, a non-resident, who owned property which would have been affected to the extent of seven cents by the election.

Wilson Tucker, attorney on the opposing side, testified that, in his opinion, the only question before Hanford was one of jurisdiction. He also said that any kind of an order, such as restraining the comptroller from spending money on the re-election, would have the effect of jeopardizing the holding of the recall election.

Scott Cathoun, corporation counsel at that time, testified briefly in the
