

NEWPORT'S BEAUTIFUL DRIVEWAYS

SOME OF THE FINEST ROADS IN THE STATE AT THIS MOST BEAUTIFUL OF OREGON'S MANY MAGNIFICENT SUMMER RESORTS.

Newport is logically the leading summer resort for the valley people and the citizens of that enterprising little city have been exerting themselves to the utmost to make it convenient and pleasant for their summer friends. In addition to the excellent train service which they have, they have perfected the wagon road into Newport from the valley so that there is not a bad place on it. In fact, the road generally is a great deal better than most of the valley roads. In Lincoln county from Toledo to Newport thousands of dollars have been spent in improving the road and the last 5 miles as you wind into Newport is one of the most beautiful drives and perfect grades that any one could ask for. Sand, which is one of the big bubaboos of the auto driver, has been entirely eliminated and the drive can be made comfortably from Salem in six and a half hours running time, the distance being about 85 miles by way of King's Valley and Blodgett. In addition, the Jump-Off-Joe hill, south of Nye Creek has been planked from top to bottom and a car can be driven to Newport's newest addition, Agate Beach. In fact, a bus makes daily about eight round trips between Agate Beach and Newport, and has been doing it all summer.

IS DOING A SLENDID JOB OF GRADING

A trip to the contract job of grading on South High street between Mill and Mission streets will convince any one of the good work being done by the improvement of that street. Up to this time this street in that vicinity has been of no service at all and with the improvements now under way completed, that portion of the city will be opened up as it has never been before. The paving is being done by the Montague-O'Reilly Co., and a sub-contract was let to M. Lynott to do the grading over the rocky hill. The sub-contractor has the most difficult piece of grading that has been undertaken in the city lately and for the time employed, about six weeks, he has done remarkably well. He is an old railroad contractor and his experience in that line has been of great service to him in expediting this work. For considerable of the distance solid rock was encountered but this was handled easily by the contractor, who has about completed his contract. Mr. Lynott has a contract for grading on the extension of the Oregon Electric south of the city and has also done a considerable of the grading on the Tillamook railroad.

THE ROUND-UP

A Teddy club is to be organized in Linn county. Jackson county boasts of having only five inmates in its jail. At Tillamook 125 men are at work on sewers and street building. Polk county prohibitionists have put a full county ticket in the field. Jackson county's tax this year is \$718,000, and of this \$500,000 has been paid up. Albany has let the contract for the erection of another school building, to cost \$7285. Fire of undoubted incendiary origin destroyed the Franklin house in Albany Monday morning. Mrs. M. E. Walker has resigned as postmaster at Bandon, and W. J. Sweet now fills the place. Rogue river orchardists will pick half a million boxes of fruit this year. Albany, according to all reports, has a very large litter of blind pigs. Portland has let a contract for the steel to be used in erecting its new jail, and central fire station. It will cost \$27,240. Mrs. H. A. Crowe of Riddle, when her gasoline stove caught fire Tuesday, carried it out doors. She was so badly burned that there is but little hope of her recovery. Congress in its appropriation bills gives Oregon \$2,300,000 this year for river and harbor improvements. Portland shows unprecedented gains in all lines of business for the first seven months of the year. At Albany about 2:45 Wednesday morning, a fire destroyed a cottage owned by J. L. Hill. Loss about \$1000. Herbert Way, 12-year-old son of V. E. Way, of McMinnville, was kicked by a horse Tuesday and died without regaining consciousness shortly after. A. G. Raab, superintendent of the North Bend schools, advocates running the public schools all the time, cutting out vacations. Lane county has brought suit against the S. P. for \$50,000 damages for destroying a county road, claiming the damage is \$5000 a mile for 16 miles. David Choat, whom all the miners in Eastern Oregon knew and liked, died at Baker, Monday. Dave was a resident of the Greenhorn district for years. Carl Blake was killed near Tillamook last Friday. The brake on his wagon refused to hold as he was driving down a steep hill with a load of lumber. He was thrown off the wagon which passed over him, killing him instantly.
