DEFENSE IS BITTER IN ARGUMENT

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.]
Hall of Records, Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 12.—Deploping the fact that Clarence S. Darrow ever came to trial at all, Horace Appel, associate counsel for the defense in the Darrow bribery trial, today opened the defense's argument to the jury.
"What a shame it is," began Appel, "that Clarence Darrow, whose name is inscribed in the heart of every laboring man in the country, should, when he has reached the highlands of life and is now on his pathway to the lowlands, be pointed at as a perjurer and a criminal!"
"What a shame it is that he, because the prosecution can point at him and say 'that looks suspicious' and 'this looks suspicious,' should risk going down the road to the dark penitentiary to a grave with a headstone inscribed 'He died in disgrace.'"
"Can you convict on suspicion only? No. You cannot convict this man unless you can put your hand on your heart and ask your souls, 'Is he guilty?'"
Speaking of Detective Bert Franklin Appel declared: "You must view the testimony of an accomplice with suspicion, because an accomplice is a convicted felon, in the eyes of God and man, when he goes on the witness stand."
His voice breaking with emotion, Appel appealed to the jurors: "Judas Iscariot was a better man than Frank-

lin or John R. Harrington. He was a gentleman and hanged himself after betraying his Master."
"Who else besides Franklin has told you Franklin got the bribe money from Darrow? Not a living soul. Who else has said Darrow told Franklin to bribe Lockwood? Not a living soul. Franklin has not been corroborated. Where is the evidence?"
"Against Franklin stands the word of Darrow and Job Harriman. How are you to convict Darrow? If Darrow had given Franklin the money and I had seen him do it and I was on this jury, I would acquit Darrow, because the evidence has not shown him guilty. We have the unsupported word of Bert Franklin, and Franklin, by his own acts, is shown to be a monster, a monster, gentlemen. Think of it!"
Appel mopped his brow and said, in a low tone of disgust:
"Yet we have seen his testimony admitted here to prejudice you against this defendant."
Shaking a volume of evidence in the faces of the jurors, Appel announced that he would tear down Ford's argument by reading the testimony cited by the prosecutor yesterday, which he said had been misstated.

AMERICAN TROOPS IN NICARAGUA

UNCLE SAM LANDS 300 MARINES TO RESTORE QUIET IN THE LITTLE STATE SOUTH OF US AND WILL PROBABLY SUCCEED IN DOING SO.

San Jose Costa Rica, Aug. 13.—That the United States will take an active hand in suppressing the Nicaraguan insurrection was indicated today when 300 more American marines were landed at Managua, the capital of Nicaragua, bombarded yesterday by rebel troops. Several women and children were injured by bullets and bursting shells.
With the reinforcements provided today, it is believed that Commander Terhune, of the American forces, will have sufficient men to prevent further attacks, which have imperiled American lives and property.
Although a proclamation was issued by the government warning the people to leave Managua, it is believed the arrival of additional American marines will restore quiet so far as the capital is concerned. The Nicaraguan government is said to be depending on the support of the United States.

First Assistant Postmaster General Granfield declared Senator LaFollette's charges were absurd. He said: "No one in the department has the slightest interest in the senator's mail."
Chief Postoffice Inspector Sharp asserted that all his agents knew better than to violate the law by opening mail entrusted to them.

GREASERS KILL SOLDIERS AND PASSENGERS

Mexico City, Aug. 13.—According to advices received here today, a state of terror exists in Ixtapa, following the slaughter of 300 natives by a band of Zapatistas who halted there on the march to Toluca, capital of the state of Mexico, only fifteen miles north. The town was garrisoned by about 100 rurales.
Fighting occurred earlier in the day near Tenancingo, and 600 federalists there defeated the rebels.
In a canyon north of Ticomán 110 miles southeast of Mexico City, a force of Zapatistas attacked a passenger train, and from ambush slaughtered 36 soldiers and more than 20 passengers, afterward setting fire to the train, according to meager details received here. A few of the wounded crawled out of the right of way, thus escaping the fate of those unable to leave the cars, who were burned.

Look Down Old Glory.
Saskatoon, Sask., Aug. 13.—While an American circus was parading here this morning a squad of Northwest mounted police and a party of citizens compelled the circus management to take down all the American flags they were flying.

PASSED THE WOOL BILL OVER VETO

Washington Aug. 13.—By grace of a ruling made by Speaker Clark, the house today passed the wool tariff revision bill over President Taft's veto by a vote of 174 to 80. Nineteen Republican insurgents voted with the Democrats.

On the vote as first announced by the speaker the Democratic-Insurgent alliance apparently had failed to pass the bill by two votes. Ten members who had paired with absentees voted as present.

Clark ruled that it took only two-thirds of the members voting "aye" or "no" to pass the bill, and ruled that two-thirds had so voted "aye" and that the bill was passed.

A violent dispute followed, the Republicans bitterly attacking Clark. On this Underwood made a point of order, thus enabling the speaker to declare the bill passed.

Before the vote was taken Cannon, of Illinois, Hill, of Connecticut, Green of Iowa, and Utter of Rhode Island, defended President Taft's veto of the wool bill.

Utter accused the Democrats of playing politics in fostering responsibility for the wool bill on the president.

Fitzgerald of New York took a hand in the debate and called the wool report of the tariff board mere guess work. Heflin, of Alabama, also spoke denouncing President Taft and the Republican party generally.

A MEDFORD MINISTER IS KILLED

Medford, Or., Aug. 13.—A report from Glendale, Or., says that Rev. J. S. Howard, a wealthy resident of Southern Oregon, while on a hunting trip twenty miles south of that place, was shot and probably fatally wounded Tuesday morning.
The meagre details did not say whether Howard was accidentally shot by a member of his party or not.
Rev. Howard came to Medford three years ago, and divided his time between here and Glendale, where he is pastor of the Presbyterian church.

ARTHUR TOWNSEND KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK YESTERDAY

News has been received in this city of the death of Arthur Townsend, a locomotive engineer, who was killed in a train wreck yesterday on the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound railroad 67 miles east of Seattle, near the station of Keechelus. Mr. Townsend has been a resident of this city for some time, but has been employed on railroad work at some distance away from home. His wife, three daughters and one son survive him. They reside at 704 North High street.

The body will arrive over the Oregon Electric late this afternoon or tonight, and will be at the undertaking parlors of Rigdon & Richardson. Announcement of the funeral will be made later.

The family is prostrated over the news of the husband and father's death. Mrs. Townsend having just received a letter from her husband, who was well and was expecting to make a visit to the family within a short time.
