## MARSHALL IS NOTIFIED OF NOMINATION

Indianapolis, Aug. 20.—In his speech notifying Governor Marshall of his nomination Judge Parker said in part: "The sons of democracy seized the opportunity to substitute practice for preaching and performance for promise by the nomination of Wilson and Marshall, and seized it with so firm a grip that it cannot be loosened by the republican hosts nor by a deluded people who have not yet discovered that the battle their leader is waging is for himself and not for the Lord." Parker charged that the republican tariff policies were responsible for the trust, adding: "The creator of the progressive party and its nominee for president occupied the white house for seven and a half years, and during that time he could not be persuaded by word or favor to lift from the people the burden of the extortionate tariff rates. It is impossible to read his tariff discussion without being convinced that he is as much of a standpatter now as when he was president. Only a stupid man will expect him to curb the trusts, when seven-eighths of all the combinations existing when he left office were created while he was the president."

**Pled Guilty to Murder.**

Oakland, Cal., Aug. 20.—Joseph Ryder, a Pullman car conductor who shot and killed his divorced wife last January, today withdrew his plea of not guilty with the understanding that he be given life imprisonment. Ryder told the court that he was away from home two years, and when he returned he found his wife, mother of his seven children, had divorced him and married again. Judge Ellsworth will impose sentence Thursday.

**Saw Custer Killed.**  
Alfred L. Chapman, the only living man who saw the downfall of the famous G. A. Custer in the memorable raid in Montana, June 25, 1876, is in the city. He has closed an engagement with the proprietor of the Wexford theatre, where he will give three talks or lectures on the incidents of his life as connected with the Custer raid at the Little Big Horn. He is about 80 years old and has lived quietly in that district ever since the raid and it was only upon the earnest solicitation of the authorities there that he finally consented to give mankind a short history of his life.

## WOULD BOND TO PAY FOR THE SEWERS

### DECISION OF SUPREME COURT ON SOUTH SALEM SEWER CREATES A TANGLE THAT IS PROVING DIFFICULT TO STRAIGHTEN OUT.

Taking the position that the only just solution for the present sewer assessment predicament that the city finds itself confronted with is the enactment of a law providing that the city issue bonds for the payment of all sewer assessments within its territory, a petition has been presented to the city council signed by 720 people asking that such a measure be initiated. Up to the present the city has followed the practice of dividing the city into districts and then have the property owners within its boundary lines pay the assessment. This plan worked well until the supreme court in a recent decision held the South Salem sewer illegal. While a petition for a rehearing in the case has been asked it is not believed that it will be granted. Should this be so, then the districts that have paid their sewer assessments would also be compelled to assist in the payment of the assessment of the South Salem sewer district. This would be an injustice and the only just plan seems to be to enact a law providing for the issuance of bonds by the city for the payment of all the sewer assessments. The first sewers installed in the city were installed by this system. Should the measure be enacted then it will be necessary to refund the people who have paid their assessments in the districts, and also apportion the assessments among all the people.

## GREEK MEETS GREEK AND ONE KILLS OTHER

Redding, Cal., Aug. 20.—Spera Kastakis, a Greek who shot and killed George Kenomas in Delta, a little railroad town 33 miles north of here, is today at large in the hills and the sheriff and county coroner are on their way to the scene of the crime.  
Kenomas was an assistant foreman of the work train and during a violent quarrel was shot five times by Kastakis. The shooting occurred in the work train and the alleged murderer immediately took to the woods. No effort at pursuit was made by the slayer's countrymen, and there are no officers at Delta.  
This is the second murder within two weeks at Delta. Frank L. Dimock, a hotel man there, was recently slain by bandits.

## SHE IS CHARGED WITH DEPRAUDING AN INNKEEPER

That the ways of the wayward are troublous was demonstrated this morning to a Miss Williams, who was arrested at Dallas by Constable John Lewis, on a warrant charging her with defrauding an innkeeper. The complainant is the proprietor of the Capital rooming house at State and Commercial streets. She has been working in a restaurant in Dallas.  
The same woman created a stir in Albany recently, when to avoid arrest she made a thrilling getaway down a fire-escape and eluded her pursuers. She was arraigned before Justice Webster this afternoon.  
The Williams woman made her first appearance in Salem about a year ago, having been employed in different rooming houses here as a chambermaid. While here she had the misfortune to injure one of her limbs severely and for a long time went about the streets on crutches.
