Crematory at Asylum

Superintendent Steiner of the Oregon asylum for the insane, has called on Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle to draft a bill to be presented at the next legislative session providing for a crematorium at the asylum for the use of all the state institutions. If this bill becomes a law hereafter inmates of the institutions who die without friends to bury them, or who are pauperized, will be cremated.

Is State Responsible

The state is responsible for the acts of the insane, so Oregon will pay a neat sum for the acts of Walter Deament, an escaped inmate of the asylum here, who amused himself by throwing stones through windows in Albany stores and residences. This is the opinion of lawyers who have looked into the matter.

Moves Headquarters

A change has been made in the management of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co., by which it becomes necessary to change the location of the district traffic agent from Salem to Eugene. C. F. Cole, who has had charge of that work here for the past year or more, left today over the Southern Pacific railroad for Eugene, where he will enter upon his duties in the larger field immediately. Since coming to Salem Mr. Cole has made many friends who are sorry to see him leave. He will still have charge of the traffic business of the office here the same as before but his headquarters will be in Eugene in the future instead of at Salem.

A Quick Capture

CHAPMAN IS A SPLENDID ENTERTAINER

The only living white man who witnessed the fall of General Custer on June 25, 1876, is in Salem for the first time in thirty-six years in the person of Alfred L. Chapman, a guide who was captured by a squad of Indians, held as a prisoner for eighteen days, then made his escape, reaching the bluffs east of the battlefield just in time to witness the battle below. He crept down as close as possible to avoid detection by the Indians and viewed the fight through field glasses while less than a mile away from the scene of carnage.

The noted visitor to the capital city is lecturing and entertaining crowded houses at the Wexford theater tonight being his last appearance before a Salem audience. Mr. Chapman has with him a large medal given him by the theater managers of Portland with the following engraved upon its face: "Played before more Portland people than any living man." He is about sixty-three years of age and claims that he is good for lots of work on the platform yet. He is billed to appear in eighty playhouses between here and San Francisco.

Mr. Chapman talks interestingly of many of Salem's old timers, and among the first he met upon reaching this city after an absence of thirty-five years was the Rev. P. S. Knight with whom he was acquainted in the years past. The entertainer is in appearance a typical plainsman and gives his audience a thrilling account of the famous massacre. He shows here tonight, after which he leaves for the south.

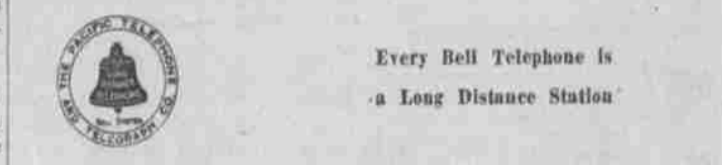
