The Pear Crop-- The harvesting of the crop of Bartlett pears is well under way at the Wallace farm across the river. So far this farm has gathered and delivered to the Salem cannery 200,000 pounds of this variety and the crop is only partly gathered. Mr. C. A. Park manager of the farm, reports that the crop this year will be about 75 per cent of an average and that the quality is excellent.

Cannery Starts Up-- The Salem cannery began operation this morning on the canning of Bartlett pears. An immense quantity of pears has been received, which have been stored until ripe enough for canning. The plant will run for about one month under full force on this fruit, which means the employment of about 250 people.

There will undoubtedly be plenty of them when the work begins.
