NORTHWEST'S CROPS ARE HURT SOME BY RAINS

Portland, Ore., Sept. 3.—Crops in the Pacific Northwest today are seriously damaged by the heavy rains falling almost continuously for many hours. Estimates are that the hop crop in Western Oregon is damaged 15 per cent. The wheat crop in several sections of Oregon and Washington is damaged 10 to 15 per cent. The oats and barley crops generally are badly hurt.

RESTRAINING ORDER MADE PERMANENT

In a decision rendered today by Judge Galloway he made permanent the temporary restraining order issued several weeks ago in the case of the American Life & Accident Insurance company, of Portland. This suit was commenced by the insurance company to restrain the insurance commissioner from revoking the license of the company. An examination had been made in February of its assets and finding them unsatisfactory the commissioner suspended the license of the company and gave it a certain time in which to make good. Failing to do so he gave it additional time and declared that unless it made good within it he would revoke the license. The company then instituted injunction proceedings, maintaining that it had complied with all of the insurance laws of the state and that its assets were of a character required by the insurance laws.

THIRD PARTY HAS NO TICKET IN NEBRASKA

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 3.—No third party ticket will appear in Nebraska, according to a definite statement issued before the opening of the progressive state convention here today. All but two of the presidential electors are for Roosevelt. The convention will only adopt a platform, name the two men to oppose the two Taft electors, and then endorse the remainder of the Republican ticket. Governor Johnson, of California, will address the convention.

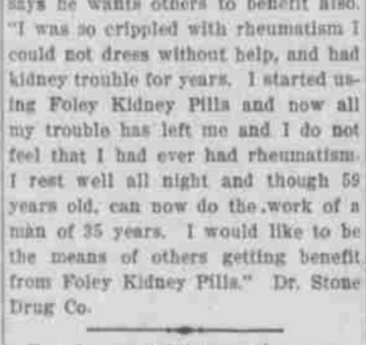
