It was said that Bryan would speak at Idaho Falls in the morning on Saturday, and in the afternoon at Pocatello. Under these arrangements, it was announced, Bryan will reach Los An-

geles next Monday morning, beginning a three days' tour of California.

HAS BEEN HERE FOR MORE THAN A FULL CENTURY

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] New York, Sept. 17.—The distinction of being the only surviving member of the class of 1831 of Williams college belongs to William Rankin, once law partner of President Taft's father and the oldest living college graduate, who today started on his 104th year, still hale and hearty.

Rankin, who resides with his daughter, Mrs. Ellen R. Bliss, at Bay Head, N. J., took his bachelor's degree at Williams college when he was 21 years old and immediately began the practice of law.

NOBLE IDEALS AS UNDERSTOOD BY A PROFESSOR

Palo Alto, Cal., Sept. 17.—"I admire the courage and wisdom of Washburne in defying custom and conventionality by entering into this so-called 'free love' contract before marrying."

This was the statement here today of Dr. Har Dayal, lecturer at Stanford University on Hindu philosophy, endorsing the action of Carleton W. Washburne, a former Stanford student, and Miss Heluis Chandler, of Philadelphia, in drawing up a contract before their marriage in Los Angeles agreeing that each should have utter freedom, even to the extent of becoming the parent of someone else's child.

Professor Dayal added: "I hope Washburne's example will be followed by many other young men who have noble ideals of life."

WILSON IS MET BY BIG CROWDS AT ALL POINTS

Aboard Governor Wilson's Private Car, Sioux City, Ia., Sept. 17.—Greeted all along the route by cheering crowds Governor Woodrow Wilson, of New Jersey, the democratic nominee for president, was given a rousing reception upon his arrival here today. The crowd at the station was one of the largest to greet Wilson on his middle western campaign trip.

Governor Wilson was taken to Morningside College in an automobile where the students had gathered on the campus to greet him. This afternoon he conferred with democratic leaders of Iowa, South Dakota, Nebraska, and Minnesota, and spoke at the interstate livestock fair here.

The candidate scored heavily with a group of workmen when his train stopped briefly at Onawa, Iowa. The governor stepped from his car and going over to the workers shook hands all around and chatted with them for a few minutes.

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 17.—Chased down stairs by a runaway cement barrel, Teamster C. O. Phillips was cornered on a landing and crushed through a rail to the floor eight feet below. Phillips' leg and the barrel were broken.

LAWSON BREAKS OUT AGAIN IN THE MAGAZINES

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] New York, Sept. 17.—Thomas W. Lawson, of "Frenzied Finance" fame, renews his war on Wall street in an article appearing in the October number of Everybody's Magazine, out here today.

Lawson charges that the real cause of the high cost of living is due to sure thing gambling on the stock exchange, asserting that through the exchange the people are robbed of two or three billion dollars annually and demands that the exchanges be closed. Lawson also predicts that the next eight years will tell whether or not America is to be "covered with moss like the slime-covered ruins of Rome."

The purchasing power of money, Lawson claims, has been cut in half during the last 40 years.

PERKINS GETS WARM UNDER HIS COLLAR

New York, Sept. 17.—The shorter and uglier word was used by George W. Perkins, red hot progressive, and former partner in the banking firm of J. P. Morgan & Co., in answering today the attacks directed at him yesterday by Governor Thomas R. Marshall, of Indiana, democratic candidate for vice-president.

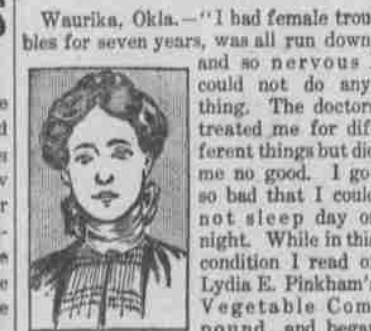
