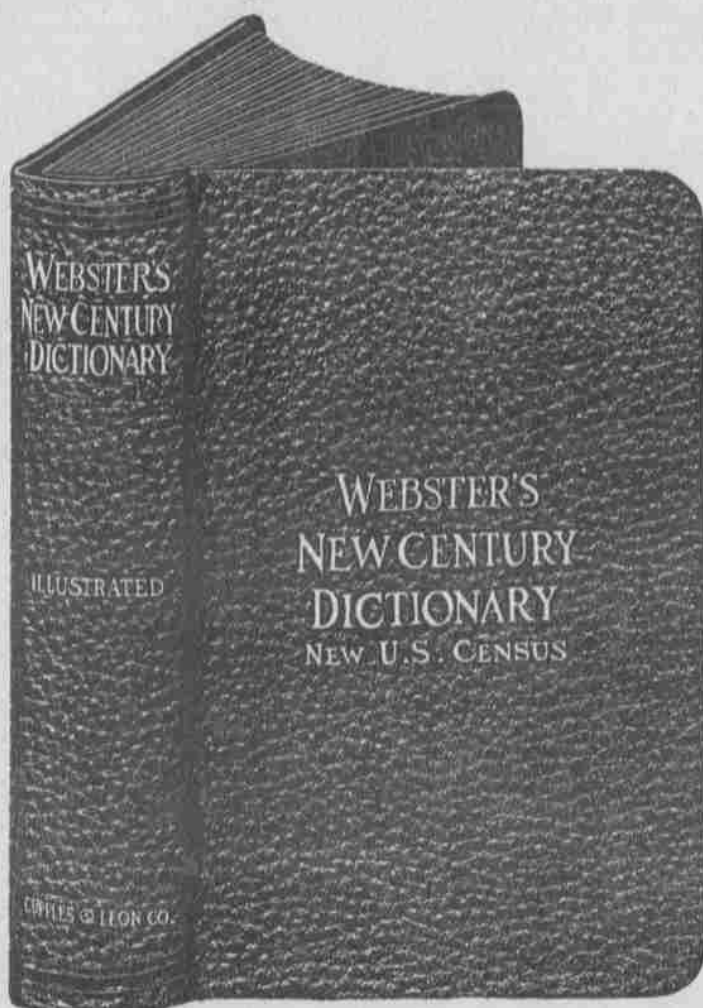

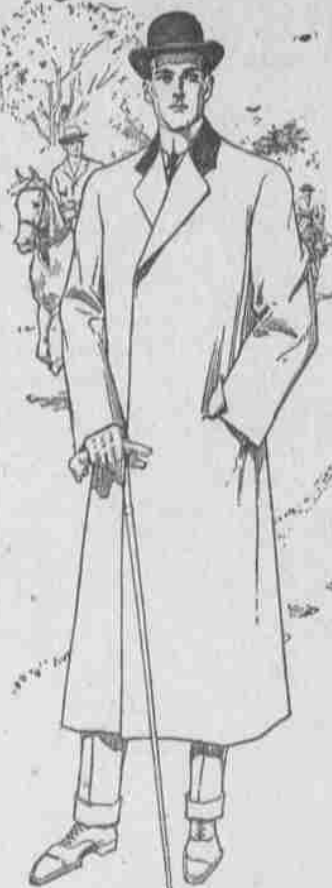

A Shortage of Cars--The car shortage situation still continues acute--especially on the O.-W. R. & N. company, and with the hope of relieving it the railroad commission has sent letters to the company urging it to do everything possible to supply shippers with cars.

Claggett, who died at a local hospital Saturday morning at 8 o'clock from injuries received in an accident while hauling boys, will be held from the residence of his father-in-law, William Goodrich, at 482 South High street, Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. Interment will be at the Claggett cemetery, five miles north of Salem.

A New Publishing Company--The Examiner Publishing Company of La Grande, today filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state. The capital stock is fixed at \$25,000, and the incorporators are E. Hanson, Thomas C. Ohmart, and Lela Day. The company will publish a daily paper.

He Hit a Tree--E. T. Barnes and family made the trip to Silver Creek falls yesterday by auto, and when at the foot of the hill and about to enter the grounds at the falls, Mr. Barnes made a miscalculation of distance and struck a tree. The sudden stop threw the occupants to the front of the car and Ruth, the 11-year-old daughter, received a slight scalp wound by striking the wind shield. No other damage was done except to bend the front axle, which made steering difficult on the return trip, which was made without further incident.

Grange Reverses Action--Salem grange on Saturday reversed itself on the question of putting the state printer on a flat salary, finding it meant additional offices, and a big appropriation for a plant and for machinery and a site for a printing office. The grange had previously endorsed the Harris plan, but, on investigation, finds it would be a great deal more expensive than the present plan, as advocated by Mr. Dunaway, and adopted resolutions to that effect. The Harris plan involves state ownership on the basis of socialism, in the opinion of the grange committee, and hence is untenable, from the grange standpoint.

To Name His Farm--Jesse Huber, who lives north of Salem, in the South Bottom locality, applied to the county clerk for a farm name, and has offered the name "Riverdale Fruit Farm" as his preference. If this name has not been appropriated the secretary of state will so inform the county clerk, after which the farm may be officially designated by that name.

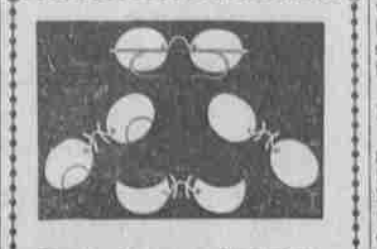
