PLEADED GUILTY TO CONSPIRACY

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 30.—Waiting their rights of time to plead and trial, seven men pleaded guilty to conspiring to violate a joint resolution by congress prohibiting the shipping of arms into a country in a state of revolution, in the federal court this afternoon. The men who will be sentenced tomorrow are Sam Rosenberg, H. Gorely, A. K. Johnson, Peter Shea, Robert Ray, Leonard Vann, and Edward Rooney.

They were arrested at El Cajon a month ago while traveling toward the seat of the Mexican revolution, carrying rifles, ammunition and dynamite bombs. The federal grand jury returned indictments against them a week ago.

STANDARD INCREASED ITS STOCK

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Chicago, Sept. 30.—That the directors of the oil trust had determined to pay the \$25,000,000 fine imposed by Judge K. M. Landis, without further legal battle, when it was reversed by the United States court of appeals, was intimated here today by C. W. Stahl, secretary of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana. This was developed while Stahl was testifying at the hearing of charges by the Waters-Pierce Oil company that the Standard Oil company has disregarded the dissolution of the United States supreme court.

At the very first meeting after the United States court of appeals had reversed Judge Landis' order, said Stahl, the directors increased the capital stock from \$100,000,000 to \$125,000,000. The stockholders considered, Stahl said, that the reversal had increased the company's assets just \$25,000,000.

SOMEBODY LYING OR MISTAKEN

Chicago, Sept. 30.—Sarcastic reference to the New York Herald's poll, which predicted the election of Governor Woodrow Wilson, the Democratic candidate for president, was made here today by Senator Dixon, of Montana, manager of Theodore Roosevelt's pre-convention campaign.
"Any figures that the Herald produces must be looked upon with suspicion. It is hostile to the new party, and it is safe to bet that Colonel Roosevelt was not favored or given the benefit of any doubts."
"Roosevelt and Johnson are certain of election. President Taft has no show, except in Utah and Vermont."

PARTY HAS ONLY ITS SHELL LEFT

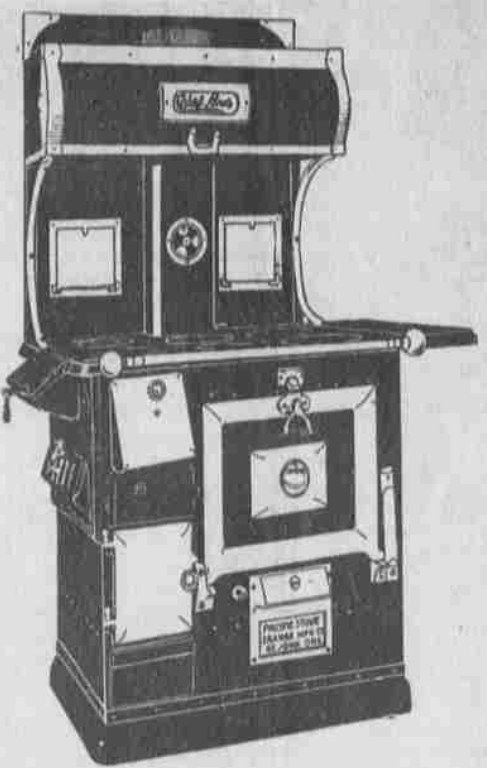
Chattanooga, Tenn., Sept. 30.—Colonel Roosevelt said in part in his speech here today:
"I see by the papers that Wilson wants Tammany to put a good man up for the New York governorship. Why didn't he interfere regarding the vice-presidency. His colleague on the ticket is one of Taggart's men, and the Indiana machine is not one whit better than the Tammany machine."
Five thousand persons who heard Roosevelt's speech applauded him heartily. A party of college students yelled.
One of the excerpts from the progressive candidate's speech was:
"Only the Republican party shall remain. It contains the machine, the bosses and the special interests, everything but the people. Penrose, Barnes and others regard the injection of the people's rule into the party as unauthorized and unwarranted imperfection."
