CHINESE REPUBLIC TO EXHIBIT

San Francisco, Oct. 15.—The new Chinese republic has signified its intention of participating in the Panama-Pacific exposition to be held here in 1915. President Moore, of the exposition company, received official information to this effect today from President Yuan Shi Kai. China is the 19th foreign nation to accept the invitation.

Dr. Chin Tao Chen, former minister of finance and delegate to the International Association of Chambers of Commerce, has been delegated as special commissioner. He is in the city, and was taken over the exposition site this afternoon. Formal selection of a site will be made later, probably by a special commission sent from China.

THE JURY ACQUITS THE WIFE

Pasco, Wash., Oct. 15.—After spending nearly the entire night in balloting, the jury in the case of Mrs. Anna Christensen, accused of the murder of her husband, a young Pasco banker, brought in a verdict of "not guilty" this morning. The case against Al. Garey, charged jointly with Mrs. Christensen, was dismissed by the court after the verdict was returned.

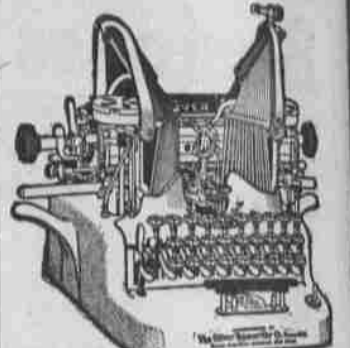
