The Great Raymond Is Coming

"Mr. Raymond has a very wide and varied range of tricks and illusions in his repertoire. He knows the tricks of the drawing-room conjuror and gives them a fresh fascination by the perfection of his manner of performing them.

He can rival any Chinese magician in the marvellous production of living creatures, water and wine from the most unexpected and impossible receptacles, and his cabinet illusions are the most entertaining and mystifying we have seen and are performed with a rapidity that leaves very little time for speculation as to what are the means employed. Indeed the speed with which Raymond gets through his whole program is most refreshing.

He has no sooner finished one illusion, which must involve the most perfect execution of complicated and elaborate machinery, than he passes almost without a pause to another.

Perhaps the best of the cabinet illusions was that described on the program as "The Throne of Mystery," in which the members of the illusionists retinue disappeared and reappeared in a way that made one dizzy. But it is difficult to say what was the most entertaining and mystifying item of a programme that was full of entertainment and mystification."—The Statesman, Calcutta, Nov. 12, 1911.

SERVED THE PAPERS ON SECRETARY OLCOTT

A suit of the United States against the Oregon Lumber Co. was filed in the office of the secretary of state yesterday. The filing of the case with the secretary of state is under a provision of the state laws that when a foreign corporation fails to maintain an attorney-in-fact, the legal papers may be served on the secretary of state and forwarded by him to the home office of the corporation against which they are filed. The Oregon Lumber Co. is a Utah corporation, and the papers will be forwarded to the office at Ogden today. The company is charged with unlawful filing on government land. The papers were served upon Secretary Olcott by a deputy United States marshal from Portland.

CAN CREATE PORTS BUT CANNOT DISSOLVE THEM

That two ports may be created in the same watershed, but that, in accordance with the decision of the supreme court in the St. Johns consolidation case, only the vote of the whole people of the state may dissolve a port, is the decision that has been given out by Assistant Attorney-General De Long, in reply to a query coming from Bandon.

The question asked by Bandon was what procedure may be taken in the establishment of a port to extend the boundary of the present port of Myrtle point to the mouth of the Myrtle-Coullie river. The attorney-general explained that it is lawful to extend the port of Myrtle Point to embrace the territory desired for annexation, or that an entirely new port may be created.

Has a Poor Opinion of the Class

JUDGE KELLY, IN REFUSING PAROLE TO GENTRY AND MASON, EXPRESSED OPINION OF HUMAN BEINGS OF THEIR TYPE.

Growing out of a sentence for Mrs. Ora Orth of from one to ten years, and of Ben Gentry and Ed. Mason of from one to five years in the penitentiary, Judge Kelly late yesterday afternoon took up the application of parole of each of the three convicted persons. Attorney Grant Corby made an earnest appeal for Mrs. Orth, claiming that the state had no proper place for the incarceration of women prisoners, and that the law only contemplated punishment such as the physical abilities of the person could endure. He contended that a woman was not strong enough physically to endure the life to which she would be subjected by reason of confinement in such a place as the state penitentiary. Mr. Winslow, deputy prosecuting attorney, made strenuous objection to parole, on the ground that Blackstone says that one of the principal purposes of punishment is protection to society from a repetition of the offense. The petition for parole seemed to meet with favor with Judge Kelly, who assured Attorney Corby that if proper reports of the life the woman was leading were made to the court, through some reputable person, that he would grant the parole. This was found satisfactory to Mr. Corby and his client, who secured the services of Mrs. Lela Lynch, of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective society. The parole was then ordered by the judge on condition that monthly reports be made of her moral character to Mrs. Lynch until the expiration of sentence, which will be at the end of ten years.

Ben Gentry and Ed. Mason were not so fortunate in their applications. After a statement in their behalf was made by Attorney Roy Shields, and some testimony taken as to their future plans, providing paroles were issued, the judge said: "There are few creatures lower than a fallen woman, and one of these is a man that lives off the earnings of such a woman. He is as much lower than the woman herself as she is lower than a respectable woman. I feel sorry for the inmates of the penitentiary that they must associate with such men as these men have been proven to be. The parole is therefore denied."

NOT A CONVICTION OUT OF 50 INDICTMENTS

Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 25.—E. L. Amidon was acquitted by the federal jury last night on the charge of census padding after a five days' trial, it being his second, the jury disagreeing in the first trial.

This closes the census prosecutions here where over 50 indictments were returned. The government did not get a conviction in the cases tried; but several enumerators pleaded guilty on agreement with the government to let off easy.

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Two Miners Killed.
