No Moving Pictures to Be Taken

Assuring the members of Woodlawn Grange, of Portland, that no moving picture photographers will be allowed access to the execution chamber at the penitentiary on Friday, December 13, when five men are to execute their crimes by hanging, and at the same time reasoning logically that according to the belief of the majority of the people of the state that hanging deters crime the throwing open of the scene of the executions to the picture men would be perfectly proper, Governor West, replies to a set of resolutions recently received from the Portland organization.

The resolution received from Portland is a protest against the presence of the picture men whom, they say, the newspapers have reported are to be allowed in the execution chamber. The governor in reply rather sarcastically, among other things, says: "However, I should think that the granting of permission to make such pictures should meet with pretty general approval for it has been contended and that contention has been endorsed, that hanging deters crime. Such being the case, and it being our sincere aim and desire to lessen and deter crime, wouldn't it be logical to contend that the making of moving pictures and the exhibition of them in such a manner as to bring the execution of this drastic penalty home to every man, woman and child in our state would go far to reduce crime and thus secure to the fullest extent those results so much desired by all?"

Fear Turks May Start Massacre

London, Nov. 12.—That the Bulgarians are having greater trouble than they expected in breaking through the Turkish defenses is the belief of military experts here today. The fighting at Tchafja is in progress today, but little advance has been made by the allied armies.

An anti-Christian feeling is growing rapidly in Constantinople and it is feared that the Moslem soldiers may start a religious massacre at any moment.

It is charged by the Turks that the Bulgarians mistreated Turkish non-combatants. A cavalry officer asserts he passed through five villages taken by the Bulgarians and that all the women had their right hands cut off, and the children's tongues were sliced.

Terrific Explosion of Powder

Gary Ind., Nov. 12.—Six men were killed at Aetna, near here today, when the pack house of the Aetna Powder company was destroyed by a terrific explosion.

Superintendent Edwards thinks the explosion resulted from the stoppage of the machinery which packs the dynamite "crimps" and the shells. He believes the jar from the machinery was the direct cause.

The bodies of three unknown men were blown to bits. About 6000 pounds of dynamite stored in the wrecked pack house exploded and it is regarded as miraculous that the shock did not cause explosions in the other eight pack houses nearby.

The shock from the explosion was terrific. It was felt at Grand Haven, Mich., residents there believing they were experiencing an earthquake. Railroad tracks a mile from the plant were thrown out of line.

Latest reports here from Aetna say some of the injured will die.
