

Wolcast to Fight Ritchie

(UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.)

San Francisco, Nov. 13.—With the return today from Los Angeles of Billy Nolan, plans for Willie Ritchie's training for his fight with Ad Wolgast on Thanksgiving afternoon were laid. Ritchie will go to Shannon's resort in San Rafael, tomorrow with two or three sparring partners and a professional trainer. All of his assistants will be picked with great care, especially in the case of a rough boxer of the Wolgast style. Admirers of the champion expected Ritchie to ask Hobo Dougherty, Wolgast's discarded sparring partner, to join his camp in order to get some inside dope on the champion, but Ritchie has not given Dougherty a thought.

Ritchie's \$1000 forfeit will be posted with James W. Coffroth today, leaving the selection of a referee the only important detail unsettled. That Wolgast will hold out for Jack Welsh is the general expectation, but if Coffroth has his way, Jim Griffin will be the third man in the ring. Griffin, however, is believed to be persona non

Probably Wanted to Loose Him

Vera Cruz, Mex., Nov. 13.—Although the reported escape of General Felix Diaz from the San Juan de Ulloa military prison is unverified, it is generally credited here today. Diaz, who was under sentence of death for rebellion against the Madero government, is said to be in an American city.

The Madero administration neither denies nor affirms the escape. Many are of the belief that the government purposely allowed Diaz to escape, not knowing what else to do with him.

Revolutionary advisers state that the jailers aided Diaz to secure his freedom and furnished him with a boat in which he made his way up the Mexican coast to a point north of Tampico. From here he is said to have donned a disguise and boarded a Mexican National Railroad train, proceeding to Matamoros, and thence across the border to Brownsville, Texas.

Constitutional Amendment Is Certain to Pass

Washington, Nov. 13.—By January 1, three-fourths of the states of the Union will have ratified the constitutional amendment granting congress power to pass an income tax law. Notice of approval by 36 of the states, this constituting the three-fourths majority required for amendment of the constitution, already has been received by the state department.

The income tax amendment grants congress power to levy a tax on incomes "without apportionment among the several states and without a census enumeration." It will enable the legislative branch of government to frame an income tax law which will be safe from attack on the ground of unconstitutionality, and will remove from the field of politics a stubborn issue which has furnished ammunition for debate in several presidential campaigns.

The income tax amendment, when adopted, will be known as Article XVI, and will become a part of the constitution by proclamation of the secretary of state. Notice has been received at the state department that Connecticut, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Utah have acted adversely on the amendment. Ten states have not yet considered it, but the legislatures in more than half of these will probably take favorable action. Only two more are needed to make the necessary 36, but Secretary of State will not issue the proclamation until one or two more than the required number have acted. Each state has a right to rescind its approval or rejection at any time, and to avoid the possibility of any one of the 36 states who have ratified rescinding their action precipitately and thus befogging the validity of the proclamation, the secretary of state will delay action until several additional states have acted favorably.

The states that have officially ratified are: Alabama, Arkansas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Georgia, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Washington and Wisconsin, unofficially Ohio and Louisiana.

The ten states that have not acted are Delaware, Florida, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New Mexico, Pennsylvania, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia and Wyoming.

The institute closed this afternoon with an address by J. H. Ackerman, president of the Monmouth Normal school on the subject "A Few Things Worth While."

Bulgarians Are Whipping Turks Again

Vienna, Nov. 13.—Lieutenant von Wegener telegraphed to the Reichspost today from the Bulgarian front that the attack on the Turkish center at Tchatalja is most desperate, and that the Bulgarians are steadily gaining ground. Von Wegener states that the Turks have been driven in rout from all their advanced positions. He adds that bad roads have delayed the Bulgarian advance, making it most difficult to get their heavy artillery to the front.

Convocation to be Held Here November 15-16

The Central Convocation of the Episcopal church in the diocese of Oregon will meet in this city on Friday and Saturday, November 15 and 16, at St. Paul's church. The object of these meetings is the promotion of the welfare of the church within the convocation, and the extension of the missionary work of the church. The central convocation consists of the counties of Marion, Yamhill, Polk, Lincoln, Lincoln, Linn and Lane. Meetings of the convocation are held twice a year, the summer meetings always being held at Newport. This is the first time Salem has been chosen for the meeting place the convocation system having been but recently adopted in this diocese.

The membership of the convocation consists of the bishop, the Right Rev. Dr. Scadding, the archdeacon, the Ven. H. D. Chambers, the clergy resident within its limits, and three laymen from each parish and mission. It is not expected, however, that there will be many lay delegates at this meeting. The Rev. Geo. C. Hunting, secretary of the eighth missionary department, will be present throughout the meeting, and will take a leading part.

The closing feature of the meeting will be a dinner for the visitors and the men of St. Paul's parish, at the Hotel Marion. Bishop Scadding will remain for the Sunday services, preaching at 11 o'clock. On Sunday afternoon he will visit the Indian school at Chemawa for a service.

The public is invited to attend the meetings, and especially the missionary meeting on Friday night, which will be of the most general interest. All women are invited to attend the Woman's Auxiliary. The detailed program is given below:
