

# The Whole Country Reunited

Of the Whole Country.

South Carolina and Massachusetts, Boston and Charleston, Fort Sumner and Faneuil Hall, the Puritan and the Huguenot and Cavalier, blue blood and red blood—it is all the same; the country is "reunited, again," for the third or fourth time since the Washington light infantry paraded at Bunker Hill and the Boston Tigers fraternized on the Battery. State lines have been obliterated. Maine salutes New Mexico, California shakes hands with Louisiana, and the words and music of "Where Rolls the Oregon" and "Way Down Upon the Swanee River" are the common songs of the plain people who have come to their own at last.

Most wonderful of all that has happened in the political life of this country in more than half a century, the triumphant host is led by a Southern man, a Virginian by birth, a Carolinian by residence and education, a citizen of the world and the governor of a Northern state. For the first time since Abraham Lincoln, a man of Southern birth will be the chief magistrate of the United States by the choice of all their people.

The South, however, was not necessary to the election of Woodrow Wilson. He could spare every electoral vote in the South without impairing his title to the office of president, and it is in this non-sectional aspect that his triumph is the greatest ever won by a public man in our history. Even better than this, if it be possible to conceive of anything better, is the non-partisan character of his victory. Tens of thousands of voters in all parts of the country broke away from old party associations and cast their ballots for him.

The election was so nearly unanimous that Mr. Wilson is not bound to any particular state or section or party for his election. He will be all the better able to administer the government in the interest of the whole people and with an eye single to the growth and prosperity of the United States. It was a Virginian who achieved the independence of the colonies; it was a Kentuckian who "saw the Union;" it is a Virginian to whom has been reserved the honor and duty of building upon the old foundations a new and larger American Commonwealth.

### WILSON CARRIED STATE BY 10,269 OVER TEDDY

Portland, Ore., Nov. 19.—Compilation of the complete unofficial vote of the state today shows that Wilson defeated Roosevelt by exactly 10,269 votes and was 13,384 in advance of Taft. The final figures give Wilson 47,997, Roosevelt, 37,728, and Taft 34,613. For United States senator, Harry Lane, Democrat, has 1764 over Ben Selling and 13,228 over Bourne. Selling's vote was 12,474 ahead of Bourne's.

The totals for the state gave Lane 56,177; Selling, 38,413; Bourne 27,959. A. E. Clark, on the Progressive ticket received 11,671 votes for senator.

### ONE CASE AGAINST JOHNSON DISMISSED

Chicago, Nov. 19.—Lack of prosecution in the case against Jack Johnson, negro pugilist, charged with the abduction of Lucille Cameron, a 19-year-old white girl, of Minneapolis, resulted in the charge being dismissed by Judge Hopkins in the municipal court.

Johnson was in court accompanied by a bodyguard of four husky negroes. Lucille Cameron is still confined in jail at Rockford.

Johnson is at liberty on \$30,000 bonds on a charge of violating the Mann white slavery act.

### For Football Game.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 19.—The three principal officers for the football games between Oregon University and Oregon Agricultural College Saturday at Albany were selected today.

George Vernell, of Spokane, was named as referee; Victor Place, of Seattle, umpire, and Carl Smith, of Portland, head line-man.

It was announced that Governor West and his staff will be present, and President Campbell, of the University of Oregon, and President Kerr, of the Agricultural College, would also be present.

# Two States to Select the Sites

San Francisco, Nov. 19.—The Panama-Pacific exposition directors were informed today that the West Virginia commission to select a site for that state's exhibit will leave Charleston tomorrow for San Francisco, and will arrive here simultaneously with the New York state commission, headed by Norman B. Mack. New York has appropriated \$240,000 for an exhibit at the fair. Governor Glascock wired President Moore his regret at being unable to accompany the West Virginia commission, which consists of Colonel F. H. Grosseup, J. E. McGraw and G. O. Nagle.

The Presbyterians of Burns, Harney county, have raised the funds for building a church to cost \$10,000.

The Harney County News claims there is an organized band of horse thieves operating in Southeastern Oregon.

Governor West was prevented delivering an address at Albany last Friday by a delayed train. Fifteen hundred had gathered to hear him.

The Enterprise says there are nine applicants for the Oregon City postmastership.

Two men have been arrested in Baker county, charged with stealing 15 head of cattle.

Mrs. Jane Casteel died at Lakeview last week. She was 80 years old and came to Oregon in 1864.

The Multnomah county returns show that George M. Davis is elected judge of the Circuit Court, department 4, by 123 plurality. Judge Tazewell, his nearest competitor, five being in the race, may contest.

Albany reports several fights Sunday as a result of blind pigs—one of them quite a serious mix-up.

Albany has organized a law enforcement league and will put an end to the blind pig industry.

Albany held its third annual chrysanthemum show Tuesday night. It was a beauty and the attendance was large.

It was not a happy home coming for a young Albany man Saturday, for when he reached that haven of rest, he found his wife had sold all the furniture and had skipped for parts unknown.

A burglar alarm in an Albany bank has a habit of going off occasionally, apparently just to keep in practice.

### WANTS UNCLE SAM TO FIX THE BAR

President Kady, of the Waldport Commercial club, who was recently elected a member of the port commission at that place, claims that the wreck of the steamer Condor on the bar in Yaquina bay Sunday was the result of lack of improvement in Alsea bay. Mr. Kady states his opinion in a letter to State Printer Dunlavy.

Reciting the circumstances of the wreck, Mr. Kady says that upon reaching Alsea bay after leaving Newport the storm was so high that passage could not be taken over Alsea bar, that the ship was compelled to turn back to Yaquina bay with the dire result that followed. The proper improvement of Alsea bay and its bar would have saved the ship, he claims. President Kady asks the state printer to appeal to Congressman Hawley to seek assistance from the government in improving the harbor.

### FIRE ESCAPES IN PLACE IN GIRLS' DORMITORY

The fire escape which has been under construction at the east side of the girls' dormitory of the Willamette University is completed. It is attached to the windows that open into the halls, so that exit may be made from any room in the building by way of the fire escape.

These fire escapes are erected under the requirements of a recently enacted city ordinance, and, with the exception of one or two, all buildings over two stories in height are now provided with the apparatus.

The staging of "The Clouds" was aided materially by the work of six of the University faculty, Prof. A. F. Biddle, of the department of public speaking, trained the cast and assumed one of the roles on account of the illness of one of the men. Prof. Strain revised and improved the translation of the play from the original Greek. Prof. Dunn prepared a short introductory talk on Greek drama and directed the substitution of a realistic title by "costal vignettes" in place of the priestly invocation with which the Greek introduced their drama.

Music for the chorus was composed by David Campbell, while the training of the chorus was in the hands of Miss Eve Simson. Both Mr. Campbell and Miss Simson are instructors in the college of music. The evolutions of the chorus of maidens who represented the clouds was directed by Dr. Bertha Stuart.

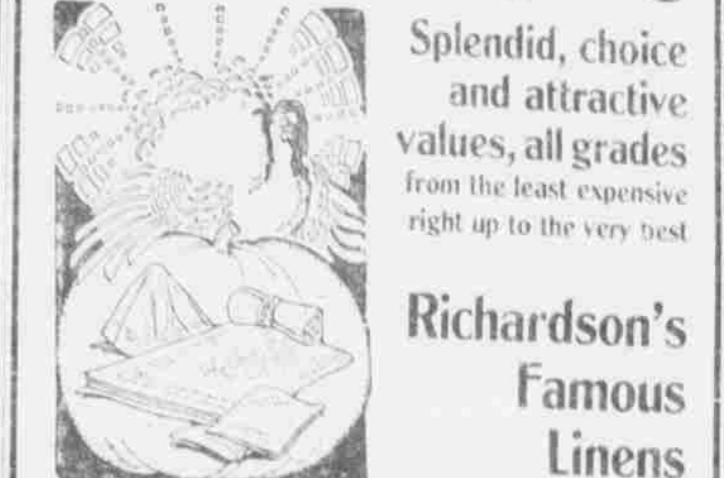
