Discusses Teddy, Taft and Wilson

SALEM MAN SIZES UP THE POLITICAL SITUATION AND POINTS OUT SOME OF THE SEEMING INCONSISTENCIES.

Now that the presidential election is over, several questions arise as an aftermath. Certain newspapers have it that Republicans elected Wilson by voting for him for the express purpose of defeating Roosevelt. In other words they sacrificed their own party, principles and all, and gave their country away to the enemy, and all for the sole purpose of keeping Roosevelt from being elected.

That was quite a sacrifice and one of a questionable result. Whether it was really worth the political condition which has obtained, can best be seen during the coming four years. Had all the Republicans who voted for Wilson with this purpose in view, voted for Taft, Roosevelt might have been elected. Would our political welfare have been better than under a Democratic administration? Very likely many thought so, since Roosevelt polled between four million and four and one-half million votes.

Roosevelt, the great disturber, the agitator, the demagogue, the whatnot, certainly has been true to the conservative element in the Republican party, has played the hand of the party, because on the subject of tariff he has always kept his hands off. To let the tariff alone is just what the Republican party has always wanted. Roosevelt let it severely alone. On the subject of trusts Mr. Roosevelt also must have pleased some part of the Republican party since he allowed several thousand to be created during his administration, and delayed radical prosecution of the present trusts. And yet, in spite of the tariff and the trusts being the pets of the Republican party, the Taft press abused Roosevelt for his administration which was quite in accord with his party at that time.

Mr. Taft, holding the highest office under Republican administration, when he foresaw coming defeat, at once undertook to please the people by creating a new tariff schedule and attacking the trusts. How beautifully inconsistent we are. The cardinal virtues of the Republican party have always been to keep wages up for workmen by means of a tariff and to cheapen the cost of articles to consumers by means of reasonable combination in trade and commerce. In the present campaign, Roosevelt was lampooned for standing by these principles while president and Taft was lauded to the sky for deserting the party standards and principles.

Even the demagogic thinker on the subject will concede that the Republican position upon the tariff is correct so far as the interest of the workmen is concerned. The only drawback in this connection is permitting the pauper laborer himself to come here and work for European wages after we have excluded the pauper-manufactured article. That is a question of foreign immigration. Many Republican tariff beneficiaries engaged in manufacture should be censured for employing this cheap foreign labor, for while enjoying the monopoly created by the tariff, they also take advantage of the cheap labor importation. So far as trusts are concerned, we all know that you can buy ready-made trust articles much cheaper than you can buy the raw material and make them yourself.

There is another way of looking at the Wilson vote. Is it altogether indicative of the effort to defeat Roosevelt, or is it a decided repudiation of the Chicago convention? Some years ago the Republican party in Oregon split over some such issue, resulting in Democratic victory. One wing still fraternizes with the Democrats and non-partisans, while the other, the immovable wheel-horses, are still waiting. They are in the minority, but still believe in their future. They represent the Taft element in Oregon, while the other wing went to Wilson and Roosevelt. Whether the present national victory of the Democrats will weaken this segment of the old party depends upon the tenacity with which they will cling to the wreck.

The people of this state have plainly spoken that they are done with party lines (at least for the time being) and are ready to set aside the cherished bulwark called the primary law and initiative and referendum, as evidenced by the great vote of Senator Bourne. When a man can defeat the regular nominee under the Oregon system by running independent, after failing to secure the nomination himself at the primaries, it goes to show in an unmistakable manner that the people are not caring much about any form of political government.

The Chicago convention is the sheet of the Republican party that stalks about at noonday. The blind masters believing that audacity and systematic organization of the nation, sweetened by political "plums" would carry the day for Taft, built a chain around all the states, using the old-line Republicans as links. The Oregon link got away at once.

The line of political demarcation was so finely drawn, sealed according to individual prospects in the event of Taft's election, that the regular machinery was set aside and a new staff created known as "Taft managers." They proceeded to elect Taft. But this new body of political workers, before they had proceeded very far, made the same mistake that was made all over the United States, i. e. they got so wrapped up in defeating Roosevelt that they forgot to elect Taft.

Much has been said about Roosevelt standing aside for Taft at the Chicago steam-roller convention. Very little has been said about Taft standing aside for Roosevelt at that same convention, when Taft well knew that Roosevelt had the majority of delegates. (If Taft didn't know it then, he does now.) It was no national secret at the time that the people didn't want Taft any more than the convention wanted Roosevelt.

It wouldn't surprise us very much that if the people could referendum the last election, they would declare against Wilson, call another election and elect Roosevelt.

Judging from the Progressive vote, it is easily to be seen which wing of the Republican party is in the ascendancy. Just where all this political pot-pourri is to end is hard to tell.
