Debauch Ended in His Death

South Bend, Wash., Dec. 5.—Wringing a pair of pulsed, fleshless hands above his head, and shrieking at the top of his voice "water, water, for God's sake," Albert Riddell, son of a prominent South Bend pioneer family, sank to the floor of a room above a pool parlor here, stone dead today, the culmination of a 17-days' spree, started with the intention of drinking himself to death.

While confined to his bare quarters he consumed a case of 12 quarts of strong whiskey, threatening all who attempted to make him quit, with a shotgun he carried constantly across his knee. He drank from the beginning to the end of the spree, and when the whiskey poison gave him a thirst that the fiery liquor itself could not quench, he rose from the chair he had occupied constantly during the debauch, and, with livid face and clutched by delirium, staggered out into the corridor, alternately shrieking and begging for water.

Swaying drunkenly and half falling at every step, he attempted to make his way to a small wash stand at the end of the corridor. Just before he reached it he threw his hands high in the air, and, with a curse that echoed and re-echoed through the dingy building fell flat on his face.

Several on the street and in the pool room below, who had been attracted by his unearthly shrieks, rushed to the scene, and attempted to help him. The body was taken to the morgue and prepared for interment today.
