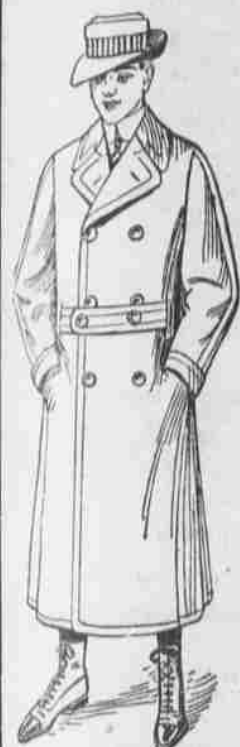

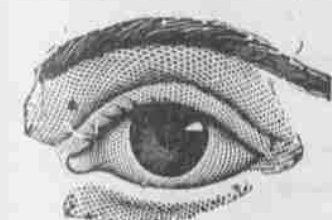

Morgan Will Be Hanged Here Jan. 16

London, Or., Dec. 9.—1957 Morgan, who shot and killed Virgie Hart, a pretty young Corvallis girl after she had spurned his love, was today sentenced to be hanged January 16, 1913. He appeared calm when asked if he had anything to say and replied he was willing to die providing Mrs. Shell, the girl's sister, who he claims caused all the trouble, were made to serve a jail sentence.

Morgan killed the girl, who was young and pretty, while she was attending the county fair here October 18. He fled to the mountains where he was pursued by the girl's father, a Kentucky feudist, who swore he would kill Morgan on sight. The latter was apprehended, however, before being brought face to face with the angry parent.
