### Father and Daughter Captured

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Washougal, Wash., Dec. 12.—Captured today by local authorities after he had forced his daughter, Hazel, to walk 35 miles through heavily wooded country, after kidnaping her from her mother in Oregon City, William Lillie is under arrest here.

Lillie was apprehended on information furnished by the girl. The pair arrived about 9:30, presumably from Portland, and while they were eating breakfast in a local restaurant the daughter secretly told a waitress of the kidnaping. The latter then summoned an officer. With bruised feet, tearful eyes and torn clothing, the girl presented a pitiful sight.

### Some Horrible Conditions on Hog Ranches

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 12.—Horrible conditions on the hog ranches where much of the pork consumed in Los Angeles and other southern California cities is raised, are alleged in the final report of the Los Angeles county grand jury rendered today.

Various ranchers, it is stated, raise hogs in this section, feeding garbage collected throughout the city. According to the jury report, cholera and other plagues, tuberculosis and swill fever are prevalent to so great a degree that the ranch is quarantined for all purposes except the slaughtering of pork for food.

### ANOTHER VICTIM OF POISONED WHISKEY

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Spokane, Wash., Dec. 12.—The death of Mrs. Jennie Ross adds the third victim to the whiskey poisoning mystery here. The discovery of Mrs. Frank James, aged 25, today in a hospital unconscious since Saturday night with symptoms somewhat similar to those which preceded Mrs. Ross, and the death of the others, adds to the mystery.

She was found in her kitchen, an empty whiskey flask by her side. The police and physicians are baffled.

The whiskey, supposed to have contained poison, was partaken of by all of the deceased and several others at a party recently.

The bottles which contained the whiskey are being collected, and a thorough investigation is being made.
