A Pitiful Tale from the South

A dispatch from Los Angeles yesterday says:

Added to the double grief of the death of the husband, for whom she had borne four sons, at the hands of the youngest born, Mrs. Daniel H. Rickert, is confronted today by a life and death problem that shows arrayed on one side her duty to the dead husband and the state and its laws, and on the other the natural instinct to protect her young.

After the boy, Martin, who is but 14 years old, had killed his father and had been taken to the inquisitorial chamber of the police. Mrs. Rickert stood staunchly by an agreement she had declared they made together, and averred with him that the shooting was accidental. She was not shaken in her declaration until, at the end of two hours merciless questioning by the detectives, the little fellow threw himself in her arms and, burying his head in her bosom, sobbed out the confession that he had intentionally shot his father, while the woman, her own face wet with tears, stroked his head and kissed the arms that were clasped about her neck.

Back in her little home, after she had been released by the police, the mother remained determined in defense of the boy. She insisted that the shot was only fired to frighten her husband, and declared that Martin had been crazed at times by her husband's "rough handling" of her. According to persons who have been with her since the shooting, her sympathy and support of her son remain unshaken, but she is evincing an increasing desire to know what, in the circumstances to be, she will be expected to do, and what she must do if she is called to testify of the thing that has shattered her home.

"Oh, my little boy!" she cried. "Why you were always hurt worse than I when father knocked me about. But you never meant to kill him. You're just a baby."

Then, apparently remembering that her boy was locked up with officers in the jail up town, she turned to one of her other sons and talked of the husband. It was then that her tears began to flow, for the first time since she had left her son at the police station, and for the time it was very evident that that the sorrow for her son was forgotten in her grief in the death

of the man to whom she had been a wife for 20 years.

Just how acute was her dilemma was shown when she raised her head from her eldest son's shoulder and said:

"If it only had not been my boy! I can't think of what they will do to him, or what they ought to do. He's just a baby. He did not mean to kill anyone. Why, it was father that he shot. He just meant to frighten him."

Love for his mother, and his determination to protect her, led the boy to shoot his father, according to his own statement at the police station, and his mother's broken story at her home.

"My husband had rheumatism," Mrs. Rickert said, "and sometimes when he got up in the morning and felt bad, he didn't seem to have any reason.

"This morning everything seemed to go wrong. My husband came into the kitchen. He started throwing me around and baby flew into a rage. He said: 'Now, look what you've gone and done. You've hurt mamma's arms. You got no right to treat her like that.'"

"Later my husband came back and apologized."

MEDFORD TRIBUNE CRITICIZES OUR JUDGE

County Judge Bushey, of Marion county, is a type of judge peculiar to the Willamette valley. He refuses county co-operation in building highways in the main part of the valley because automobile tourists would be benefited, and he refuses to assist construction in remoter sections because too few people would be benefited.

The governor recently secured an allotment of the forestry fund for the construction of a road between Niagara and Detroit, on the north fork of the Santiam river. Some \$6000 or \$7000 would be expended by the government and state and the county was asked to co-operate to the extent of \$1200. The labor was to have been furnished by convicts. The road would open an undeveloped section to settlement, and the state contemplated erecting a large trout hatchery and establishing a game preserve. The county court refused co-operation, so county court refused the deal off the governor has called the deal off and eastern Marion county will remain isolated, and the county lose the government money.

Governor West announces that he is through trying to assist road construction in Marion county, and will devote his energies to sections of the state where he will receive "at least a little co-operation on the part of local officials."

Another Train on the Electric

Next Sunday another train will be added to the Oregon Electric service between here and Portland, says the Albany Herald. The service between here and Eugene will also be slightly changed, so that people south of this city will have more time to shop in Albany between trains. The local train that now leaves here for Eugene at 2 o'clock will then leave at 3:40, thus giving several hours in the Hub City to the residents of the large territory that is naturally tributary to the city. The new schedule will be so arranged that the people of Halsey and Harrisburg, and other local points, can come to Albany to trade and have several hours to spend in the city. At the same time the schedule will be so that the people of Junction City and other points may go to Eugene with the same convenience.

The Oregon Electric company is now operating its freight trains through the valley with electric motors instead of steam engines. A through freight leaves Portland every night at 8 o'clock arriving at Eugene at 5 a. m.

When Mrs. James was found unconscious in the kitchen of her home, a flask labeled "Old Kentucky Rye," almost drained, was on the floor nearby.
