have argued longer, but the governor checked him with a gesture.

"Morgan did not kill York with premeditation," he repeated. "But we will kill Morgan with premeditation. We will strangle him, and Garrison and Roberts and Faulder. The people clamored for the lives of these men. They cried out, 'Crucify them! Crucify them!'"

With tears in his eyes, but with a sneering curl at the corner of his mouth, he concluded the interview:

"It would be unfair to our invited guests, who have looked forward with so much pleasure to this event, to rob them of a single item on the program."

Faulder Was a "Jollier."

All of the bodies except that of Morgan will be interred in the prison cemetery. Morgan's body was given over to Father Moore, the priest who administered to him in his last hours and on the scaffold.

The condemned men all slept soundly last night and all ate their breakfast this morning. Garrison arose earlier than his fellow prisoners because he had taken a liking to A. G. McMillen, the death watch and wished to tell him good-bye. As Faulder was led from his death cell and through the iron gate that leads to the death chamber, he said to Chapel Guard Fisher:

"Good-bye and good luck."

"Good-bye Faulder," responded Fisher.

Faulder walked up the steps to the scaffold with a half-burned cigar between his lips and with the sun shade above his eyes from under which he looked complacently upon the crowd as he calmly placed his hands upon the rail and spoke.

Faulder has maintained a grim jollity ever since he came to the prison in March. The other day Morgan, who occupied an adjoining cell, dressed up to have his photo taken. As he passed Faulder's cell the big man jollied him through the bars.

"You'll have to take that collar off Friday," he called.

"To all of his condemned fellows he said,

"I want to go out first and blaze the trail for you."

"To what one thing do you attribute your being here?" he was asked by Chaplain Bauer.

"I suppose I might say it's delirium tremens," answered Faulder.

All Told Brief History.

All of the men gave brief sketches of their lives to Chaplain Bauer. Morgan gave letters and other articles which he wishes to be sent to his friends to Chaplain Moore. Roberts recently wrote a letter to his sister which is in the hands of Chaplain Bauer and which will be mailed to his relative. Garrison who wrote in verse, had prepared fourteen verses on the execution which he intended to read on the scaffold. He made no attempt to do this, however.

Morgan's lawyer was with him to the last, and the fight for his life did not end until he stepped upon the gallows. He was baptized some days ago by Father Moore. The priest administered the complete Catholic service while the rope was being adjusted and while Morgan and Roberts hung beneath the floor of the scaffolds.

Brief Stories of Crimes.

H. E. (Jack) Roberts was convicted in Portland for the killing of Donald I. Stewart and George Perkins and was brought to the penitentiary on July 6. Roberts was born in Portland January 1, 1887, and was reared near Oregon City. He has a brother who is an inmate of the insane asylum. One

of his sisters is an epileptic and his father was a convict. Roberts never acquired the drink habit, and attributed his downfall to being hounded by officers after he had been discharged from the penitentiary. He began his career as a criminal, he said, when he stole some fishing tackle and sold it to purchase food. He claimed that he lost jobs because his employers found out that he was a convict. Roberts attempted to hold up an automobile on the Portland-Oregon City road, and when the driver refused to stop he shot Stewart and Perkins.

The last day of the present month would have made one year since Frank Garrison was brought to the penitentiary. Garrison was born in Polk county about 45 years ago. Having trouble there he went to Coos county where he lived in the hills with his dogs. The body of Roy Perkins was found in Coos bay and some of his belongings were discovered in Garrison's cabin. A verdict of murder in the first degree followed the trial. He was convicted on circumstantial evidence. He told an officer where Perkins' body would be found and described its accoutrements. The body was found as he said it would be.

Mike Morgan was formerly a soldier. He was convicted in Josephine county for the murder of John York committed while he was intoxicated. Morgan was born at Altam, Ind., October 20, 1882. He enlisted in the army at Fort Douglas, Utah. While in the army he acquired the drinking habit. Coming to Grants Pass in 1911 he entered the employ of John York. In an altercation while Morgan was under the influence of liquor he killed York. He weighted the body and sunk it in Rogue river. Two weeks later he was arrested while making his way north with York's horses and wagon. He has six sisters and two brothers living and two brothers and two sisters dead. He was the son of a blacksmith.

Noble Faulder was born in New Zealand. He had been a sailor, a miner and had worked in construction camps. He killed Louis Gilbert in a quarrel over a dog. He was received at the penitentiary March 15. He had little to say about his relatives. A brother fought in the courts for his life and visited him just before the execution. Faulder began drinking when nine years old, and said that the two things he loved most in life were whiskey and work. He was over six feet tall and weighed 180 pounds.

A Pitiful Little Story.

It is strange indeed through what channels and tortuous ones, too, our lives run. Here is a little side-story of today's tragedy that illustrates this. Mrs. L. U. Josse, of this city, was a schoolmate of Mrs. Roberts, mother of the man hanged today. After leaving school Mrs. Josse did not see Mrs. Roberts for many years, never, in fact, until about two years ago, when Mrs. Roberts called upon her here—and called upon her for aid, being destitute, ill clothed and helpless. Mrs. Josse gave her clothing and money assisting her materially, and crying, Mrs. Roberts told her that she was here to see her son "Jack" Roberts, who was confined in the penitentiary. She said he had always been a worthless, idle boy, and his habits had finally landed him in the penitentiary. He never showed any desire to help his mother in any way, and when she visited him in the pen at that time he cursed her and she seemed broken-hearted when she visited Mrs. Josse. It seems, though, that the approach of death has touched even his hardened heart, and recently he wrote Dr. Byrd here, asking him to sell his Roberts' body to the Willamette medical college for \$100 and send the money to his mother; but even this eleventh hour awakening to his duties to his mother
