Think Boy Got Away With Gems

POLICE THINK HIGH SCHOOL BOY WAS THE BURGLAR WHO THURSDAY NIGHT BURGLARIZED THE WOODS HOME.

San Francisco, Dec. 14.—That a high school youth, desperately in need of funds, robbed the home of S. N. Wood, a prominent clothing merchant here, Thursday night, when \$5000 in jewels was stolen, is the theory of the police are working on today.

The theory is given strong credence since the receipt of a note by Wood offering to return the jewels for \$2000 cash. Handwriting expert Kytka, after an examination of the note, expressed his belief that it was written by a youth. It is penned on a sheet torn from a small note book, such as students use, and the orthography, spelling and punctuation bear out the school boy idea.

The note was brought to the Wood home by a small boy, who said a stranger had given him 19 cents to deliver it. A maid held the lad and summoned Wood. The latter immediately telephoned the police, who responded by sending a wagon load of policemen to the house. The stranger could not be located, and the boy was sent home.

The Gutter Runs Full of Cream

With the price of whipping cream ranging from 25c per pint and upward, a strange sight was presented today, when a good-sized stream of this valuable product made its course down the gutter from the Townsend creamery to Jim Lawrence's store, where it disappeared in the sewer. A can of whipping cream became unmanageable when an employe of the creamery attempted to remove it in the building, and, slipping out of his grasp, fell to the sidewalk, and the contents went into the gutter before the heavy receptacle could be uprighted. Several canines took advantage of the "free lunch" by lapping up what they could, and, if the reporter is not mistaken, several consumers were a painful expression when they passed the cream flood, evidently remorseful over the waste.

Portland, Ore., Dec. 14.—The bottom is expected to drop clear out of the local fish market for several days here, following the granting of permission by the county commissioners to the contractors on the old railroad bridge to blow up the remaining piers of the bridge in the Willamette river.

The run of carp, salmon trout and other varieties is especially heavy at this season of the year, and an awful slaughter of the fish is sure to result when the piers are shot skyward.

In fact the expected fish mortality drew the attention of the state game warden to the blasting, and he also granted permission. Thousands of Portlanders are expected to "get in" on the big free catch.

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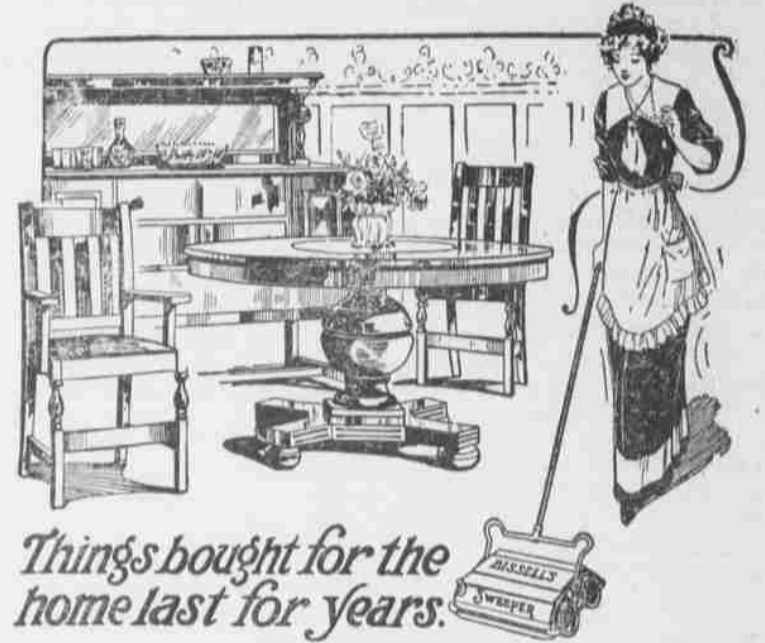
