New Time Table

Beginning tomorrow, the Oregon Electric will put into effect the following time table:

Train No. 10 will leave Albany at 7:30 a. m., Salem 8:00 a. m., giving earlier service into Salem from the south. Train No. 7, which formerly went through to Eugene, leaving Salem at 1:00 p. m., will stop at Albany, and No. 9, leaving Salem at 4:00 p. m., will go through to Eugene. Train No. 11 will leave Portland 4:00 p. m., instead of 4:22, arriving Salem 5:05, instead of 6:20. No. 17 leaving Portland 6:30 p. m., instead of 6:25, and a new train added, leaving Portland 7:55 p. m., arriving Salem 9:25 p. m. No. 21 will leave Portland 9:45 p. m., instead of 9:30 p. m., arriving Salem 11:40 p. m., arrive Albany 12:40 p. m. No. 13 will leave Portland 5:00 p. m., limited, arriving Salem 6:30 p. m., Eugene 9:00 p. m. No. 22 will leave Salem for Portland and way points at 5:50 p. m., instead of 6:05, and this will be the only change in leaving time of northbound trains out of Salem.

Wages Too Low.

Washington, Dec. 14.—That no man sailing on the Pacific coast below the rank of mate gets sufficient wages to support a wife was the declaration here today of Andrew Furuseth, of San Francisco president of the International Seamen's Union, before the Curtis sub-committee hearing of arguments of the seaman's "involuntary servitude bill."

"Able seamen," argued Furuseth, "are leaving the merchant marine for the fishing trade because a man can furnish a living for himself and wife by fishing, but he can't by sailing."

Strike Is Ended.

London, Dec. 14.—The strike of railway train men at Newcastle, Leeds and other cities precipitated by the reduction in rank of Engineer Knox for alleged intoxication, was settled here tonight, the men returning to work immediately.
