HIS WIFE NOT WANTED IN HOTELS

Chicago, Dec. 16.—The white wife of Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist, is not wanted in Chicago hotels.
"This fact is brought home to Mrs. Johnson today, Manager Kauffman, of a fashionable Chicago hotel, having ordered her out while in company with another white woman and two white men. Johnson was not present. The four sat down to a table, and ordered several bottles of wine before Mrs. Kauffman learned Mrs. Johnson was one of the party. Then he requested her to leave.
"Now she will know after a lot more incidents like this," said Kauffman, "why that other poor creature committed suicide."
Mrs. Johnson and her party left without a protest.

A DISEASE PECULIAR TO SOUTHERN STATES

Washington, Dec. 16.—Six thousand one hundred and five persons are known to have succumbed to pellagra from 1907 to 1911, according to a report issued by the public health service.
The disease practically is confined to the southern states and has been rampant in Virginia, North and South

Governor's Suggestions ON IRRIGATION PROJECT

Carolina, Georgia, Kentucky, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana.
In response to a call for information, the institutions and physicians throughout the country reported 26,000 cases to the public health service for the three-year period. Of the total the eight states above mentioned are credited with 15,880.
Governor West has mailed to the members of the state legislature a statement referring to the Columbia-Southern Carey act irrigation project. The governor submits for the consideration of the legislature five possible methods for completing the project.
The methods suggested by the governor are (1) a contract with A. D. Katz; (2) contract with some other Oregon person or company; (3) irrigation district; (4) United States reclamation service, either alone or through co-operation with the state of Oregon; (5) state reclamation.
Each of the methods suggested is elaborated upon in the statement.

Irish Comedian Dead.

Baltimore, Dec. 16.—Famed as the only actor who played Irish parts without a makeup, John T. Tierney, for 20 years one of the best known comedians on the stage, is dead here today from tuberculosis.

HAMILTON IS PAROLED FROM PRISON

Walla Walla, Wash., Dec. 16.—Ortis Hamilton, former adjutant-general of the Washington National Guard, who was convicted of embezzling state funds, and sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary, was paroled today, after serving two years and 10 months.
A special meeting of the board of parole had his case under consideration this morning. The session was brief, and Hamilton's parole was ordered to go into effect immediately.
Hamilton has been a trusty at the penitentiary for almost two years, acting in the position of bookkeeper.
He was convicted on December 23, 1909, of embezzling \$1118. This was the only charge against him, though his pecuniaries were approximately \$10,000. This money Hamilton is said to have squandered in his infatuation for a woman named Hazel Moore, who subsequently was popularly given the sobriquet of the "woman who did not care."
Mrs. Florence Hazel Hamilton, during her trial here last week for alleged white slavery, made the charge that there was a frame-up to convict her before Hamilton's release. The case ended with a disagreement of the jury.

Sydney Had Bad Hol.

Sydney, N. S. W., Dec. 16.—Scenes of the wildest disorder were enacted here today when the premier, Hon. J. McGonn, attempted to make a speech at the ceremony of turning over to the postoffice the mansion formerly occupied by the governor-general of Australia, Lord Denman.
More than 200 policemen resorted to strenuous means to keep order among the thousands of people who gathered at the scene, but their efforts were fruitless. For an hour and a half the fighting and rioting continued, many persons being injured and trampled upon. The premier was compelled to cut down his speech to a very few words.
Lord Denman was notified recently to move out of his residence, as it belonged to the state and was needed to add to the Sydney botanical garden.
The rioting followed the protests of the citizens' committee against the eviction of the governor-general.

Schedule N, sundries, January 29.
Free list, administrative and miscellaneous, January 31.
A statement from the committee requests all persons who desire hearings to apply to the committee at once and to file briefs.
