MAN HUNT ENDED IN DEATH. (Continued from page 1.)

Chambers telephoned to Santa Ana and inquiries were discontinued to find Rindick. Other points at which were searched, many witnesses being given in as deputies.

It was shortly before noon that the sheriff's posse came upon its quarry near the mouth of a canyon in the Santa Ana hills. Gramping behind a boulder the man opened fire. He fired four shots before the officers could reach and at once of the four reports a man fell. He then fled into the canyon, while Rindick ordered the men to their stations along the rim and at other end.

How long the man ran held out to the stronghold against the posse or whether Rindick will shoot to catch him as he tries to start his out, is probably undecided. The fellow's tactics stand against the officers has caused the belief that he will never be taken alive.

The canyon in which he had taken refuge is a narrow slice in the hills. It is only a few places would it be possible for him to escape over the rim. These are being guarded by squads of men in addition to the regular line along the gorge.
