

No Doubt About His Insanity

SEATTLE MAY ENTERS NEWS OFFICE, AND AT THE POINT OF HIS GUN DEMANDS \$1000 OF THE CITY EDITOR—HE DIDN'T GET IT.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Seattle, Wash., Jan. 3.—Entering the editorial rooms of the Post-Intelligencer at 7:15 o'clock last night, C. L. Frank, a fireman, pulled a revolver from his pocket, and leveling the gun at Joe Gilbert, city editor, demanded \$1000 in five minutes. Gilbert kept up a conversation with the man, while one of the staff slipped away and telephoned the police. When the officers arrived they had no difficulty in arresting the man.

At the police station he gave his age as 27. Frank made his way into the editorial department unobserved, and it was not until he walked up to the city desk and pulled the gun, that any member of the staff was aware of his presence. During the conversation he kept Gilbert covered. He is believed to be insane.

THREE IN THE PEN AWAITING EXECUTION

Unless further court proceedings cause delay the grim law must be followed by hanging at the state penitentiary both this month and next. Bob Morgan, who killed his former sweetheart at Condon, Gilliam county, is sentenced to be hanged on Thursday, January 16, and on February 14, St. Valentine's day, Mike Santos and Frank Seymour, from Jackson county, are due to say the death penalty.

It is said that Morgan's attorney will probably file an appeal to the supreme court. If this is done the execution of the sentence will be indefinitely delayed, if not made lighter. All three of the men occupy death cells at the prison except at certain times, when they are allowed to be out for exercise.

Trying for Release of Union Men

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Chicago, Jan. 3.—Representing 32 of the 33 union men sentenced to terms in the federal prison at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., for dynamite conspiracy, Attorney E. N. Zollne, at 10:30 a. m. today filed a writ of superseas and a petition for their release on bonds with the United States circuit court of appeals here. The petition alleges that the defendants have been denied their rights in being deprived of liberty, pending the outcome of the appeal motion. H. S. Hockin was the only convicted dynamiter unrepresented.
