Hot Fight
for Start
In Senate

Permanent organization of the Oregon senate was practically effected at 12:50 o'clock this afternoon by the overwhelming election of Dan J. Malarkey, representing Multnomah, Clackamas and Columbia counties, to the presidency of the body. Malarkey received 27 votes; Butler, of Hood River

and Wasco counties, two votes, and Calkins, temporary chairman, received one. Malarkey was bitterly opposed by Senator Joseph and Dan Kellaher, of Multnomah, but those gentlemen were lonesome in their opposition.

A torrid time is expected in the session tomorrow morning, when the contest between Edward E. Kiddie and J. N. Burgess, for the senatorship from Union and Wallowa counties, is to come before the senate. Burgess apparently defeated Kiddie by a narrow margin, the latter at once inaugurating a contest for the office. Both men participated in the proceedings this morning.

Seems Cut and Dried.
The temporary organization was sun dried and fine cut—so obviously so that when Dan Kellaher made the motion to adjourn for recess and caucus, he said:

"If it isn't already arranged for, I move we adjourn. However, I do not want to usurp anybody else's right in making the motion."

The session was called to order at 10:15 o'clock by M. O. Miller, of Linn county. In a concise talk he outlined the business of importance that is likely to be taken up during the 40 days.

Without opposition Senator Calkins was elected temporary chairman and John P. Hunt, of Woodburn, chief clerk. They were placed in nomination by Senator Bean, of Linn and Lane, and Patton of Marion, respectively.

Burgess Leads Committee.
Senator J. M. Burgess, of Umatilla, led the committee on permanent organization. The other members of the committee were Barnett, of Morrow, Umatilla and Union, and Hawley, of Yamhill and Polk.

A committee on credentials was named, consisting of Dimick, of Washington, chairman; Bean, of Lane and Linn, and Carson, of Marion.

Oath Is Administered.
Chief Justice McElrath, of the supreme court, was escorted to the platform by Senators Miller, Patton and Von der Hellen and administered the oath to the senators at 11:45 o'clock. The nomination for president was at once called for and Senator Moser, of Multnomah placed Malarkey in nomination. Senator Joseph at once moved for adjournment, but the motion was voted down.

This brought forth from Joseph an acrid attack on Malarkey, who concluded his speech by nominating R. R. Butler, of Hood River and Wasco counties, for the presidency.

Joseph said that he would not feel that he was doing his duty to his constituents or to himself if he did not oppose the election of Malarkey.

"I have not been in on any of his trades," said Senator Joseph, "although I might have had anything I wanted at his hands."

Here Joseph was interrupted by Senator Bean, who protested that he was out of order.

Temporary Chairman Calkins ruled that, inasmuch as he had risen to make a nomination, he was in order. The senator was not interrupted again during his eloquent address, except when he stopped to spit cotton.

Recalls Ring Rule.

No. 5—Manzanita. Taken from the bank of Rich Gulch the site of the first permanent mining camp in Oregon, established near Jacksonville, Jackson county, in January, 1851.

No. 6—Service Berry. Taken from land once owned by Ewing Young, the first American settler in Oregon west of the Willamette river. Young came to Oregon in November, 1834, and settled in Che-halem valley, Yamhill county, about twenty-two miles south of Portland. He was the first American settler to die leaving property. His death occurred on February 15, 1841. The probating of this estate a few weeks later by a group of American citizens, without form of law and without the least bit of graft was the first act relating to civil government in American territory on the Pacific slope. This experience led the handful of American settlers in Oregon to undertake the organization of a government, and this was formally established on May 2, 1843. The probate court alluded to was created April 15, 1841, and the estate of Young was valued at \$3500.

No. 7—Royal Ann Cherry. Taken from one of the seven or eight hundred fruit trees brought across the plains from Salem, Henry county, Ia., to Oregon in 1847, by Henderson Leclerc and his son, Alfred, and planted half a mile north of the city of Milwaukie, Clackamas county. This was known as the "Traveling Nursery" all trees being grafted and of the best varieties known fifty years ago—and was the starting point of the fruit industry of the Pacific coast.

No. 8—Juniper. Taken from a tree

in Umatilla county and is used in this gavel to suggest the wheat and stock-growing sections of eastern Oregon.

No. 9—Handle, White Oak. This grew on the site of Oregon City, the first capital of Oregon territory, and the oldest incorporated town west of the Rocky mountains in American territory. The first newspaper on the Pacific coast was printed at Oregon City, February 5, 1846, the first gold coins made there early in 1849, the first church established in 1842, and the first Masonic lodge chartered October 19, 1846. No. 10—Oregon Yew. This grew near the site of Champos, Marion county. At this place on May 2, 1843, the first effort was made to establish a permanent civil government in Oregon, then the entire Pacific Northwest. There were present, pursuant to call, one hundred and two settlers to hear the report of a previously appointed committee, which contained a plan of organization. After considerable discussion this plan was adopted by a majority of two, one of whom, Hon. F. X. Matthieu, now well advanced in his ninety-fifth year.

No. 11—Juniper. Taken from a tree
