DOUBTED GOD OR GOVERNOR.

legislative assembly for the use of the institutions or departments. In case an emergency shall exist requiring the expenditure of a greater sum than the amount appropriated by the legislative assembly for any institution or department or for other expenditure of moneys not provided for by law, the bill creates an emergency board consisting of the governor, the secretary of state, the state treasurer, the president of the senate, the speaker of the house and the chairmen of the ways and means committee of the senate and the house to authorize deficiencies to be made.

In his veto message Governor West said: "Inasmuch as there are going to be no deficiencies during this administration, unless they be caused by acts of God or the public enemy the passage of such a bill is unnecessary and would only encumber our statute books with useless laws and further complicate our already complicated system of government."

Other Bills Voted On.

The senate sustained the veto of the governor of senate bill No. 1, providing a manner by which ports may get, by purchase unappropriated and unsold tide and overflow lands. All of the senators present voted against the bill. Four members were absent.
