Gets After Japanese Gardeners

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Olympia, Wash., Jan. 21.—Two bills were introduced in the senate today by Senator Cotter, of Sumner, Pierce county, to aid farmers who market their produce in Seattle in their fight against the commission combine known as the "big six" in Western Avenue.

One of his bills amends the Paulhamus bill, introduced at the session two years ago, by removing the question relating to bonds. In other respects, it is similar to the Paulhamus measure requiring that commission men keep their books open for producers, and make correct account of all shipments.

Cotter's other bill prohibits leasing lands outside cities and towns to aliens, and provides a penalty of a \$1,000 fine and a year's imprisonment or both. It is aimed at Japanese growers, who have under lease large areas of land around Seattle.

Senate Kills Junket.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Olympia, Wash., Jan. 21.—The members of the house of representatives and the lieutenant-governor and such clerks and stenographers as may be necessary, won't go upon that little \$500 junket they had arranged for themselves Monday afternoon.

The senate today, by practically unanimous vote, upset all the plans. Senator Jenson and Senator Jackson spoke in defense of the junket, but were laughed down by the others. There were but a few scattering votes in favor of supporting the action of the house.

Reno Has Water Famine.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Reno, Nev., Jan. 21.—Fire engines were pressed into service here today to pump water from the Truckee river into the mains to relieve a famine caused by all ditches leading to the city reservoir being clogged with ice. Most of the residences here are without water, while the business section has only a meagre supply.

Girl's and Boy's Aid Society Files Report

Nine hundred and forty-five children were received and cared for during the years 1911 and 1912 by the Girls' and Boys' Aid Society of Oregon, according to the organization's biennial report, just made to the legislature.

Of the above number 332 were new cases received from 27 counties. The remaining 613 were children who have been placed in family homes, and were returned to the home after placement, either by the custodian as being unsuitable, or by the officers of the society. The average number of children on hand per day at the receiving home was 68. The number of employees of the institution is six.

The state contributes \$5000 per annum to the society, and 22 counties and other societies contribute much more. The receipts for the past two years were \$28,627.70, and disbursements \$27,292.37. W. T. Gardner is superintendent of the institution.

The society rescues homeless, neglected or abused children of Oregon; receives, by legal commitment or otherwise, children from the juvenile courts of counties; provides for such until suitable homes or employment and oversight are found for them, and continues a systematic attention to their condition and treatment.

The society is supported by state and county contribution, from the interest of a bequest fund and voluntary contributions of the public—and both organization and work are non-sectarian.

Children may be had for service at wages; for board, clothing and schooling, or for legal adoption.

LAW MAKERS VIOLATE THE CHILD LABOR LAW

Because the present House of the state of Oregon broke one of the state's laws, Harold, son of Representative P. O. Bonebrake, of Philomath, Benton county, is no longer a page in the House, his place having just been taken by his 16-year-old brother, Walter.

At the beginning of the session, Speaker McArthur appointed Harold Bonebrake and Clarence Meek, son of Representative S. A. D. Meek of Washington county, as pages. Members gasped not only at the apparent extreme youth of the boys, but at the idea of these mere babes being sons of members. While there was much talk about the matter, still no one raised a rumpus.

What made the matter especially aggravating was that many boys of from 14 to 18 years of age were after the page jobs.

The state compulsory school attendance law provides that all children under 14 years must attend school and cannot be employed at labor. Word of the page situation finally reached Mrs. Millie Trumbull, of the child labor commission of Portland, who investigated, and on learning that Harold Bonebrake was much less than 14 years old, put the matter up strongly to Speaker McArthur. Hence Harold's hike home. But Representative Bonebrake managed to retain the pageship in his family, hastily bringing on his 16-year-old son Walter.

Clarence Meek was more fortunate than his erstwhile partner, being able to establish that he was 14 years old. Each page draws \$3 a day from the state, the same as his father.

After the Corporations.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 21.—In order to compare the proposed anti-trust legislation in New Jersey with that proposed in California, Senator Carr, author of the bill to prevent rate slashing to kill competition, today wired Governor Wilson, asking for copies of his bills. Carr declared that he "is going down the line" in his fight to rescue the state from trusts and monopolies, and he says he has been promised hearty support.
