The mandate of the supreme court in the case of the State vs. Willis S. Property rights in both cases were brought to a satisfactory settlement.

County Clerk Gehlhar today issue a marriage license to George B. Ashford, of Jefferson, and Nora E. Jarvis, of Aumsville.

Sheriff Now Has the Tax Rolls for Year 1913

With the total amount of taxes to be collected from Marion county taxpayers ranging in the neighborhood of \$811,641.27, the tax roll was turned over to the sheriff for collection today by County Clerk Gehlhar. The corporation tax roll, which amounts to about \$100,000, is still in the hands of the clerk compiling the same, due to the late date on which the state tax commission made its returns to the county clerks throughout the state.

With the exception of the corporation tax, the taxable items and the amount of the tax are as follows: State and county and roads, \$376,943.83. School, \$116,857.34. Special road tax, \$28,914.51. Special city tax, \$158,925.56.

Ex-Sheriff H. P. Minto was the first person to remit the amount of his taxes and receive the first receipt this year. He called for his assessment the first thing this morning and settled his account with Sheriff Each. County Clerk Gehlhar had submitted his application for a statement of the amount of his taxes, but by some unknown book or crook, the ex-sheriff beat him to the honor of being the first.

Sheriff Each declared today that the clerks who compiled the tax roll this year are deserving of great credit for the manner in which they expedited their work, and that the taxpayers should be grateful to them for their performed diligent work in order to place the rolls in the hands of the collector in due time to send out statements to the taxpayers of the amount of their taxes.

A hardship has been undoubtedly worked upon the county clerk inasmuch as the state tax commission has been slow in turning over the amount of tax assessed to the corporations in Marion county. The county clerk is unable to compile any figures in relation to the corporation tax until the commission makes its annual report, and inasmuch as the report is not forthcoming until up to within a week of the time when the roll shall have been completed, it is almost an impossibility to render any definite statement until the telephone, railroad and telegraph lines have had their valuations determined. The regular tax roll is not necessarily prepared for collection at this time, but in order to accommodate the public, the roll has been placed in the hands of the sheriff in order that he may answer requests for statements of the taxes of those desiring to take advantage of the rebate granted up to the fifteenth of March.
