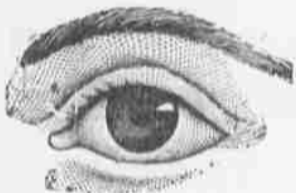

COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE THE PENITENTIARY

Meeting at the state penitentiary at 9 o'clock tomorrow the committee appointed from the legislature to probe the affairs of the prison will begin its work. Members of the committee have stated that the investigation should be carried on for a period of at least two weeks, and it is expected that merely a fair start will be made tomorrow.

The committee of investigation is composed of Senators Hollis and Ragsdale and Representatives Lewelling, Smith and Laughlin. The plan is to be pursued in making the inquiry may be to occupy the Saturdays and Sundays until the close of the legislative session. Not only will the management of the prison, as carried on by Superintendent Lawson, be gone into thoroughly, but the prison policy of the governor will be taken carefully under consideration. The governor himself has requested the most searching investigation that the time at the disposal of the committee will allow.

Senators Lester and Stewart and Representatives McDonald, Spencer, Brunk will begin an investigation into the management of the state training school tomorrow.
