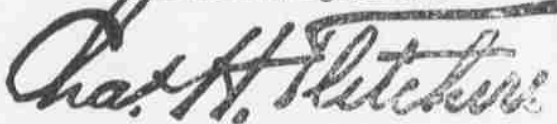

WAR DEPARTMENT
ORDERS OUT BRIGADE

Washington, Feb. 13.—The war department issued yesterday afternoon orders to the provisional brigade of the army, numbering 5000 men, to hold itself in readiness for instant service. It will be assembled from points as far north as Niagara, and as far

west as San Francisco, in the event mobilization is decided upon.

STIRS UP THE HOUSE

Speaker McArthur Deplores Any Sectional Feeling, and Forbes and Johnson Do Not.

The Capital Journal's columns of yesterday got, shaggy speaking, the goat of Hon. Pat McArthur, speaker of the house, and so much so that the usually urbane gentleman gave way to his feelings and devoted a ten minute address to advertising this newspaper.

True, he scolded a little, too, but twice during his remarks he called the Capital Journal an "excellent newspaper," and again as "a very excellent newspaper." Right out loud, just like that, he said it.

Now, Pat cannot outdo the Capital Journal in courtesy, and he's going to get his back scratched right back. He is one of the best speakers that ever graced the lower house of the Oregon legislature. In fact, he's a Jim dandy speaker. He keeps things moving with despatch during house sessions. But the dilatoriness of the legislature complained of lies not in the despatch of business in open sessions, but in the lack of getting important business, the big business, ready in committees for transaction in open sessions. That is not Pat's fault.

It was just before the afternoon adjournment that Speaker McArthur started his address by waving a copy of the Capital Journal around in the circumambient ozone and asked the house members to turn to the X-Rays and Smiles columns on the editorial page. Two-thirds of the members turned their Capital Journals to the page, while the other third kicked themselves for not taking this paper and vowed they'd subscribe as soon as possible and quit borrowing it.

Pat reads this column daily with great glee at the hot shots therein contained on other folks and things, but yesterday, alas, he took umbrage at two items. The first related to the fact that the legislature would surely put the governor in the hole unless it got busy quick and passed some bills for him to veto.

The second told of the importance of the Multnomah delegation in the so-called organization that has been and is controlling the house and senate, and pointed out that the big majority, the outside members, could easily put a crimp in the organization minority if they would only unite.

Pat explained that if these items were not in the funny column and had been written seriously, he would be madder yet—in fact, he would resent them seriously. He had not yet seen the news article on the first page, where it was written seriously and in bold type.

In all fairness to the speaker it should be stated that he is a conscientious official and is jealous of the reputation of the house. He thinks it is an excellent body and that it has accomplished wonders so far this session. Like the fond mother of a spoiled child, he can see no faults.

Portland delegation came down to the Capital with any other purpose in view than the welfare of the whole state, and declared that the delegation played fair with all and made no effort to hog things for Portland. He pointed out the importance of Portland, half of Oregon in population and therefore paying about half the taxes of the state, and declared further that Multnomah people cheerfully paid these taxes, too. Therefore, they were entitled to considerable say in legislation. Nevertheless they were modest and liberal.

Then the speaker decried the efforts of up-state papers to create sectional feeling against Portland and the Multnomah delegation, and declared that no such feeling existed in the present legislature. Sectional feeling and factions did exist in past legislatures, he said, and he pleaded for continued "unity and harmony" in the present body.

But the speaker did not deny that there is an organization, in fact he said nothing on that subject, so he probably knows nothing about it. In view of this, Governor West and not a few country members of the house who were on the point of insuring, are mistaken.

Therefore the Capital Journal withdraws the allegation that an organization controls the legislature and is holding back the many important bills carrying \$9,000,000 in appropriations with only seven days of legislative life left.

The Capital Journal amends this by stating that there is a Providence, a mysterious unseen force controlling the legislature and holding back these appropriation bills so as to be able to throw them before the house all in a lump at the last minute when they cannot possibly be given half-way proper consideration and must be rushed through pell mell. And this unseen force will undoubtedly come out from the confusion greatly benefited.

Meanwhile, in view of yesterday's developments the rural members of the house, who were about to insurge, think that the publication of their plans in the Capital Journal yesterday, has thrown a scare into the organization which will result beneficially to their interests. Hence they will wait and see before going further with the insurgent plot.

In this connection it is rather significant that Speaker McArthur and the house ways and means committee held a meeting in the speaker's office last evening.

Hardly had Speaker McArthur finished his speech yesterday afternoon than Forbes, of Crook, who had read the news article which escaped Pat's eyes, was on his feet. He objected to the statement in this story that Portland members were the brains and prime movers in the organization. Mr. Forbes wanted it distinctly understood that the Portland members were not the brains of the legislature. He would match the brains, intelligence and ability of the eastern Oregon delegation with those of any other, he said. He also deplored sectional feeling, and then proceeded to denounce a statement made by Johnson of the Marion delegation as to the value of land in a certain section of eastern Oregon.

Mr. Johnson immediately replied by making his previous statement stronger and declared that he had told the truth as he was familiar with the section referred to.

Howard, of Douglas, at this juncture put an end to the combat by moving an adjournment. His suggestion proved to be from the right oil can, and the "move" moved without a squeak, and the house was adjourned.

HOUSE AND SENATE
ANNOUNCE ELECTION

Washington, Feb. 12.—The House and Senate today, meeting in joint session, formally received the electoral votes by states and declared Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey elected President of the United States and Governor Thomas R. Marshall of Indiana vice-president. The ceremony was held in the House chamber.

At one o'clock this afternoon, Senator Bacon of Georgia, president pro tem of the Senate, mounted the rostrum, took the House gavel and seated himself beside Speaker Clark. The senators were seated to the right of the rostrum and the representatives to the left.

The speaker read the votes of the states alphabetically. At the conclusion of the rollcall, Senator Bacon formally announced the vote and declared Wilson and Marshall elected. The session then adjourned sine die.

When California's vote was announced, the Progressives applauded despite Bacon's continued pounding for order.

EASTER COMES AT
ITS EARLIEST DATE

Coming on March 23, Easter Sunday will be earlier this year than it has been since 1856. For years there has not been an Easter Sunday earlier than March 23, and during the remainder of the twentieth century there will not be an Easter observed earlier than March 24.

In 1856 Easter Sunday fell on the 23rd of March, and also in 1815. In 1848 it fell on March 22, the only

year it figures that early in either the Nineteenth or Twentieth century. It has twice been on the twenty-fifth of the month, but never earlier.

In 1916, Easter Sunday will fall a month later—on April 23. This is within two days of the latest date at which the date may be set. In 1886, April 25 was the date upon which Easter was observed, and this won't be the case again until 1943.

The way by which Easter day is determined is that the first Sunday after the paschal full moon—which is the fourteenth day of the calendar month, or the full moon, which happens upon or next after the twenty-first of March—is the day set for observing Easter. If the full moon happens upon a Sunday, then Easter day is the first Sunday following.

In the year 235 A. D. a general law of the church was enacted at the Council of Nice, prescribing for the universal church a day for this solemnity. The bishops of Alexandria were given the task of computing the time of Easter for all the churches. The Alexandrian system was so obscure and incorrect, however, that Easter was observed on different dates in almost every city. In 669, Theodore, archbishop of Canterbury, established the reformed Roman calendar in England.

Girls Win Strike.

Camas, Wash., Feb. 13.—Twenty days of striking on the part of 38 girl employees in the paper bag mill of the Crown Columbia Paper company have gained them an advance from \$1.10 to \$1.25 per day and the girls returned to work today with the assurance that the increase will be given the first of March.

Improved sanitary conditions in the mill, which were also demanded by the strikers, are promised by the company.

ROBBERY AND LOOTING
THE ORDER YESTERDAY

Vera Cruz, Mexico, Feb. 13.—While the battle rages in the streets of Mexico City between the Diaz and Madero forces, organized mobs are carrying on a general looting campaign, according to dispatches here yesterday afternoon. Even houses in the line of fire are being plundered, and it is said, a state of anarchy is threatened.

Nearly every store in the city has either been plundered or is closed. Food stuffs are so high as to be unavailable to the poorer classes, and a famine is threatened.

Banking Bills Passed.

The House yesterday passed the bill of the committee on banking, to limit deposits in state banks to ten times the capital surplus of each bank, and passed another banking measure relating to giving preference to depositors. Among other bills passed were: By Abbott—requiring county courts to ask for bids where any work in building or improving a permanent highway will exceed the cost of \$1000; by Westerlund—relating to stock running at large; by Mitchell—relating to dissolution and reinstatement of corporations and articles of incorporation.

ARE COMMERCIALIZING
EVEN THE BABIES

*Albany, N. Y., Feb. 13.—How children of tender years slave for hours in canning sheds, with their blistered fingers wrapped in rags, and likewise in tenements, making toys, flowers and plumes, and how women toil sometimes for mere pittance in industrial establishments in this state is described in the report of the New York state factory investigating committee, submitted to the legislature today.

The report says that canneries operating in the rural districts never have obeyed the state child labor law, "because they never had to."

"More Babies" Employed.

"Employment of mere babies," the commission holds, has been the result and it adds that of 1259 children found at work in 33 sheds, the eldest was 14 years old, and the youngest was 3.

Many of the canners, the report explains, are opposed to the employment of children and half of them do not resort to it, "but as the canning industry is largely devoted to the exploitation of foreigners the parents of the children make them work."

Women's Health Impaired.

Of women workers the report says: "No woman can work from 16 to 21 hours a day for weeks and in some cases months without permanent injury to her health. Yet women are doing just this thing in the up-state canneries in binderies and in other factories and in the shops during the six weeks' Christmas rush. In the large canneries, the work keeps up pretty regularly for a season of four or five months. A week of 85, 95—in cases 119 1/2—working hours is not followed by a week of comparative rest, but another almost as bad, and the pay averages 19 cents an hour."

The committee recommends the creation of an industrial board with power to make regulations to every industry.

Loss of Leg Delays Law.

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 13.—When Ernest M. Dobbs failed to appear in Justice of the Peace Fred C. Brown's court yesterday to be sentenced to six months for petty larceny an investigation

was started which disclosed that Dobbs had fallen under a street car and was at the time court officers were looking for him undergoing amputation of his right leg below the knee.

Dobbs had pleaded guilty to taking electric goods valued at \$19.20 from his former employer, but when up for sentence January 27 obtained a stay, pleading his wife was destitute and would starve unless he could earn enough to support her while he was in jail.
