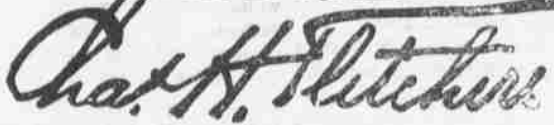

ONLY CITIZENS CAN
WORK ON PUBLIC BUILDINGS

Sacramento, Cal., March 12.—By adopting the Fitzgerald amendment to the present act relating to work on public enterprises, the state assembly declared today that none except native born and naturalized citizens of the United States shall be employed on

any work either done directly by the state, county or cities or under the supervision of these political subdivisions.

This broadens the law to apply to subcontracts for public work. The bill now goes to the senate.

LESS CONSTITUTION
MORE COMMON SENSE

Judge Sargent Says Greed Is Always Invoking the Constitution.
Time for it to Quit.

San Francisco, March 12.—That less "constitutional limitation" and more common sense should be used in the interpretation of statutes, especially those intended for the bettering of social conditions, is the gist of an opinion handed down here yesterday by Superior Judge Bradley C. Sargent, which caused his court room to sit up sharply.

Judge Sargent handed down his decision while sitting for Judge Cabaniss. He reversed a decision of Police Judge Deasy in the case of F. Encoyande a laundry man arrested on charges of violation of ordinance pertaining to the employment of laundry workers between 7 p. m. and a. m. Judge Deasy dismissed the case, holding that the city supervisors in framing the ordinance, had exceeded their authority, and that they had deprived the defendant of a constitutional right.

In his opinion Judge Sargent sets forth: "It has been said with truth that the only liberty worshipped in this country is the image graven on the American dollar. Sordid avarice and greed for wealth reek not of the cry of starving children or the despairing sighs of weakened motherhood. Women today in this city working in laundries cannot protect themselves against the competition they meet, and therefore it has become the duty of the board of supervisors to protect them, even against themselves.

"The ordinance is question was obviously designed for the betterment, morally and physically, of a large class of workers. The constitutional bugaboo has about reached its limit; what is constitutional is largely a matter of individual opinion. But what is best for society generally is a matter of experience and every day association.

"Who are more qualified to determine what laws are for the best interests of society—the legislative body the members of which come in daily contact with every phase of life, or judges, who upon the bench or in the recesses of their chambers, are entirely untouched by the circumstances of conditions surrounding labor?"

RIGHTS OF PROPERTY
AND RIGHTS OF MAN

Our new incoming president proposes to pay some attention during his administration, to that comprehensive problem of the "rights of man," in contradistinction to the "rights of property." Mr. Wilson believes that the "rights of property" have had about all the nursing due from the government, especially so in those cases where they come in victorious conflict with the "rights of man." That the social and economic conditions of men have been long enough contingent upon the artificial stability of property rights, is one of his maxims.

It is plainly to be seen that every attempt to draw upon the generosity and liberality of those concerned in the one problem of property, for the express purpose of adding to the general welfare of mankind, will mean a fight of some consequence. Property will raise its hand and say, "You propose to interfere with my inalienable rights to acquire, and you also propose to thwart the first law of nature—self-preservation. Without property I can not secure a competency." But the exponent of "rights of man" replies: "We do not deny your rights nor would we have you neglect to provide for you and yours, but, all we ask is that our social and economic inequalities be not forever subservient to the rights of property."

standard, each with equal rights and each equally respected. Of course, we have had some notable examples of "philanthropy" along these lines. Rockefeller, to the surprise of the American people suddenly donated a couple of million of dollars to the eradication of the hook-worm. It developed later on that the only thing that had ever been discovered which would put the hook worm out of commission was kerosene. So, "property" gave up its millions for the benefit of "man," but selfishly knew that its nation would return a hundred fold. Now this is one popular way of property conceding to the rights of man.

Our new president would have all this done with the right spirit. He would take away the selfish interest—the demand that there be some return. He would legally make every man his brother's keeper. In short, he proposes to change human nature which had been running riot these many years. It is a stupendous undertaking. We might in time so completely harness human nature that it would be obliged to do right at all times from artificial force, but to change its organic nature is a slow process. The decline of the lust for blood in earlier centuries gave civilization a chance to leave its mark upon human nature. Still, it might be said that encroaching civilization caused the decline. Civilization's restrictions no doubt have something to do with the present apparent docility of the animal in man.

When you come down to the bare proposition of property rights giving away for the greatest good to the number, our laws will have to be made from Bessemer steel. This is not saying that there is no such thing as charity, kindness, benevolence and humanity to be found in the land. Perhaps the following will illustrate the point: A certain member of a church called upon a neighbor for information. The caller was poor and needy. "Do you give one-tenth to the church out of your husband's salary, or do you pay your living expenses first, and then give one-tenth of what is left?" Without waiting for a reply, she went on, "I always pay my bills first and if I have anything left, then I give the church one-tenth. Am I right?" Thus you see, the difference between the gross and net income vitally affects us all.

From a purely sociological standpoint the domination of the rights of man over rights of property is strictly socialistic in tendency. The Encyclopedia Britannica says in its definition of Socialism, that the state has the right to equalize the social inequalities existing. Woodrow Wilson's administration will be watched with considerable interest in view of the great scope opened in his proposal to place the social and economic rights of man on an equality with the native instinct of mankind to covet in the name of self-preservation.

PREPARE TO HANDLE
THE COAST LUMBER

Five Big Steamers Each to Carry Four Million Feet Now Being Built.

[UNITED PRESS LEARNED WIRE.]
Tacoma, Wash., March 12.—In anticipation of the opening of the Panama canal, several eastern capitalists are establishing a line of freight steamers to carry West Coast lumber from Tacoma and Puget Sound points to Atlantic coast ports, according to advices received today from the Merchants' and Manufacturers' Board of Trade of New York, by the commercial club here.

Associated with the new enterprise is F. S. Pendleton, who is said to be the largest individual lumber carrier on the Atlantic coast. In the beginning the line will consist of five steel 10-knot freight steamers, each capable of carrying upwards of 4,000,000 feet of lumber.

The fleet will be increased as the demand for tonnage justifies.

GOOD ROADS WORK
PUSHED BY O. A. C.

R. E. Edgcomb, of the highway engineering department at the Oregon Agricultural College, held an extension institute at Toledo March 4 at the request of the Lincoln county road supervisors to discuss good roads building. The extension division is receiving requests from all parts of the state for similar help as a result of the position the college has taken in regard to types of road construction most economical to maintain practical, and proven generally satisfactory.

A short course for supervisors who can arrange to come to the college for instruction is now given, and all who wish to study road building at home have only to ask for the extension bulletin, "Highway Improvement."

Gus Lange, Scappoose, supervisor of district 17, Columbia county, recently spent ten days at the college taking the short course in highway construction. He learned to use the transit and level by laying out imaginary roads over the campus, and establishing proper grades under supervision of S. M. P. Dolan, civil engineer. He is now able to take the instruments, establish grades of sufficient accuracy determine contours and profiles and for his work in professional road building.

Every road supervisor in Oregon should spend ten days or more at the college learning the scientific side of road building sufficiently to enable them to handle the roads of their own districts in the best way possible, Mr. Lange said on leaving.

"My district has just voted a five mill road tax which will amount to about \$4000," he said, "and I now feel that I can see that it is properly invested in permanent improvements. Since I have had the advantage of this brief instruction, I have learned how to verify the work of engineers and to do some of it myself."

Land Suit to Be Hurried.

Washington, March 13.—Senator Lane, Representatives Sinnott and LaFerty and National Committeeman King called yesterday on the attorney general and urged that the Southern Pacific land grant suit be expedited as speedily as practicable consistent with public interest.

Senator Lane explained that he is getting many complaints on account of the delay, especially from settlers whose lands are involved. The attorney-general promised to give the request prompt attention, and said it probably would be necessary to withdraw B. D. Townsend from the California oil land and other cases to direct him to devote his entire time to the land grant suit in Oregon until it is disposed of.
