CITY OF SALEM GETS THE BEST OF PRICES

In conversation with a Journal reporter today, a citizen who attended the meeting of the committee to select paving last night said:

"The city of Salem gets better price for asphaltic pavement or cement concrete base than other cities of the Northwest. When the bids for the paving of North Commercial, Chemeketa and Twenty-first streets were opened last Monday evening it was found that the Clark & Henery Construction company was low bidder for an asphaltic pavement on a cement concrete base. The local contractors bidding on a cement pavement submitted bids somewhat lower than the bid of the Clark & Henery Construction company, but when the cost of maintenance is considered for a concrete pavement without the asphalt concrete pavement without the asphalt wearing surface will cost considerable more."

A Mounted Carrier.

Beginning Monday, the 17th, the local postoffice will add a mounted carrier to the already large number, and a wide scope of territory will be included in the carrier districts of Salem.

The district over which the new carrier will operate is bounded as follows: From D street to Madison, and from Water to Twelfth. This district will take in the Oaks addition to Salem, and another boundary will include the new territory from 21st to 25th street, thence to Bellvue street.
