Against Trading Stamps.
At a noon meeting of the Salem Business Men's League at the Marion Hotel today, war was declared to the death on a certain trading stamp concern, which now has representatives in Salem attempting to work up a trading stamp business among local merchants. A public meeting of the league is to be held at the headquarters of the Salem Board of Trade tomorrow night at 7:30 o'clock when the trading stamp question will be further discussed.

Long ago the Salem business men, almost unanimously, declared against the use of trading stamps, which they pronounce a bogus method of procuring trade. The present trading stamp representatives have only recently arrived here, and, as soon as their presence was made known to members of the league, a meeting of that organization was called with a view of putting an end to the business in this city without much delay.

Other questions will be discussed at the meeting tomorrow night. One of the subjects will be that of fake advertising. The league is adopting a new rating book, which will also come in for a large part of the forensic efforts of the members at the meeting.
