GETS INFORMATION FROM ROAD COMMISSIONER

A. J. Anderson, the chairman of the special committee appointed by the council to determine what class of pavement shall be used in the improvement of North Commercial street, today sent a letter telegram to Edward N. Hines, chairman of the Wayne county, Mich. highway commission, requesting an opinion upon the value of the different classes of pavement used in that county.

Mr. Hines answered as follows: "We have a light traveled street in Detroit built of concrete about 16 years ago, and still in good condition. Concrete streets in Bellefontaine, Ohio, 18 years old, Woodward Avenue road four years old, Wayne county, with very heavy mixed traffic, in first-class condition. Wayne county has bonded for \$2,000,000 for buildings roads, \$700,000 has already been spent for concrete roads, and the balance of \$1,300,000 will practically all be used for the same purpose."

Registered Voters Only.

Registered voters only will be allowed to vote at the special election to be called in September for the purpose of voting on measures passed by the legislature and referred to the consideration of the people of the state in accordance with the Daybill. The Gill bill, however providing for permanent registration of voters and which will become a state law in June will allow registrations with the county court any time prior to 30 days before an election.

All present registration laws are eliminated by the passage of the Gill bill and allows all persons who have registered with the county clerk to continue to vote without further registration as long as they are residents of the same precinct.

The question has been opened by a letter received by Attorney-General Crawford from County Clerk Bilyeu of Wallowa county who wished to know who could vote at the special election provided by the Day bill. Under present laws only those who are registered for the 1912 elections or those who have subscribed to blank A would be allowed to vote. This limitation would come from the present laws which allow the registration books to open only during the seven years.

But the Gill bill makes it possible for registrations to take place at any time.

except within a 30-day limit before elections.

The bill plainly provides that no person may vote unless he or she is registered. The bill includes a provision, however, that should the supreme court declare the section invalid which prohibits voting without registration, then a blank is provided which may be subscribed to by the person desiring to vote.
