TO EXAMINE RURAL CREDIT SYSTEM

American Commission to Visit Europe and Study Systems of Foreign Loans to Farmers.

Washington, March 21.—Instructions to the American diplomatic officers by Europe to secure courtesies from the foreign governments for the American commission which is to visit Europe this spring under the auspices of the Southern Commercial congress to investigate rural credit systems were issued today by Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan.

Before leaving office Secretary Knox gave the state department's approval to the rural credit investigation but since that time the American commission has received approval by congress and President Wilson points out that congress has appropriated \$25,000 for the expenses of several commissioners, who will be appointed by President Wilson, to co-operate with the American commission. No salaries will be paid to these commissioners. Congress also passed a joint resolution directing the secretary of state "to bespeak for the proposed American commission the diplomatic courtesies of the various European governments." In carrying out these directions Secretary Bryan has instructed the American ambassadors in Europe to secure for the commission "such courtesies and assistance in the line of its endeavors as it may be possible to obtain," and adds "it will be seen that by this joint resolution the commission under the direction of the Southern Commercial congress is given semi-official standing."

This act of Secretary Bryan raises the American commission to the standing of a semi-official body and assures it every facility that can be extended by the European governments for the conduct of its investigations. The commission is directed by congress to submit to that body a report on the subject of rural credit systems and the question of adopting the co-operative principle in all lines of agricultural production and distribution.

Though the Southern Commercial congress began its efforts in a campaign for the adoption of rural credit systems it has received such strong support both from the federal and state governments and from private sources that it has been able to enlarge the scope of its work to include a thorough investigation of all forms of co-operative production and distribution in the agricultural field. Co-operative credit is only a part of the immense system of co-operative organizations which has spread all over Europe. Co-operative purchasing organizations, co-operative and municipal markets, where farmers' produce is sold by agents at a fixed commission, the entire balance of the proceeds going to the farmer direct, and co-operative associations for packing and distributing farm products, will all be investigated.

The Democratic national platform, on which President Wilson was elected, contains a plank endorsing the agricultural cooperative movement and President Wilson has already evinced a keen interest in the subject. There now exists a committee of nine governors of states to consider legislation necessary for the organization of co-operative credit and other associations. This committee, as well as the federal congress, will receive the report of the national commission, and it appears now that next fall a nation-wide campaign will be waged in the interest of the co-operative movement among American farmers as a means to increase agricultural production and lower the cost of living.

PRUNES, POOLS AND ALSO LOGAN BERRIES

Assistant Manager Paulus, of the Salem Fruit Union, is sending out notices to all members of the union that the prune pool, which has been formed by the union, will close April 1. After that date no growers will be allowed to sign up for the pool.

This year the prune pool will represent about 20 per cent more prunes than have ever been represented in a pool formed in Salem before, and about 30 per cent more than were represented last year. Fully 1000 acres will be represented by the long list of growers who have signed.

Lawrence R. Adams, a dried fruit and canned goods broker from Chicago, visited the fruit union yesterday afternoon. For the benefit of Mr. Adams, Bob Paulus opened up a couple of cans of loganberries, and declares that the Chicago broker threw a regular fit in his manifestation of delight over the delicious fruit. He ate both of the cans. Mr. Adams is said to be very enthusiastic over the prospects for a great crop of the small fruits in the Willamette valley this season.

The fruit union is shipping the last of the dried prunes remaining from last season. There are still a few cars left.

A carload of loganberry posts were received at the union yesterday, and will be distributed at once. It is feared that the supply of posts will be far too short this season. At present orders for about five carloads of the posts have been lodged with the union. This is far in excess of the usual demand at this stage of the season. The order will be filled as soon as possible. There are orders for two carloads of trellis wire placed at present. More orders for wire are expected in a few days.

In the line of extending its activity, the union has put in a small stock of mill feed and poultry supplies, including all kinds of poultry foods and medicines. A line of alfalfa meal is also included in the mill feeds now on hand. This stock is a new feature at the fruit union.

To Inspect Wiring.

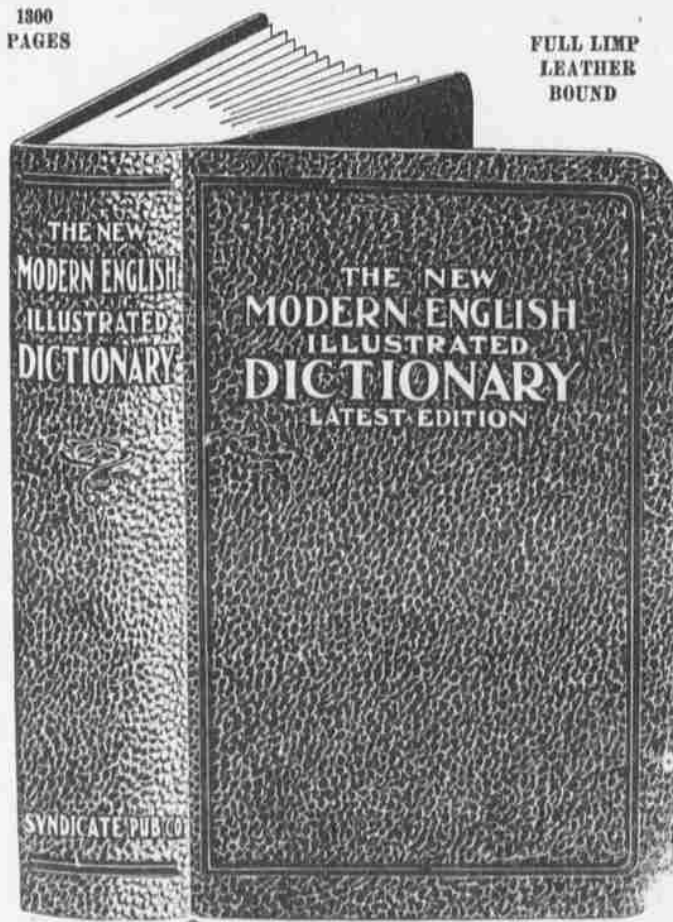
