at Marion and the opera house at Greenfield were wrecked.  
**Eight Inches of Snow.**  
Green Bay, Wis., March 21.—Eight inches of snow fell here last night, accompanied by a high northwest wind, which piled up huge drifts. Wires in all directions are prostrated, and trains are from two to five hours late.  
Cleveland, O., March 21.—Rocked by a 60-mile gale, Cleveland shivered this afternoon in one of the worst blizzards of the winter. Several residences and buildings have been unroofed and street car traffic is practically at a standstill.  
Reports from Tiffin, Ohio, say that a smokestack blew over there, killing William Hicks and seriously injuring six others.  
Toledo reported an 80-mile gale at noon. Heavy damage is also reported from many northwestern Ohio towns.
