## BASEBALL OUTLOOK GROWING BRIGHTER

Manager Baker Is Getting Matters Arranged and Spring Practice Will Begin Soon.

The outlook for a good season of baseball in Salem is good today, and there seems no good reason to believe that the city will fall short of phenomenal record of last season. Manager A. R. Baker plans to start getting the grounds in shape early next month. He is confident that the team will furnish the fans with better baseball than during last season and promises to spare no effort to give them the best available talent. Portland has several semi-professional teams and a number of them will be seen here. Albany and other towns will send teams. The old grounds will be used this year, but it is not known what arrangements will be made for next season.

Earl Baker, who pitched such a good season last year, will be in shape to handle the sphere. He has not "gone lack" and will be in better shape than last year, it is believed. Spring practice will begin soon.

Captain Baker was very popular as manager last year and the fact that he will continue in that capacity stimulates interest in the national pastime here.

The Socialist majority in the parliament of the little principality of Schwarzburg-Rudolstadt and the government are deadlocked over this question. ## THE DISASTER DID NOT MATERIALIZE

Reports That Big Dam Had Broken Prove Untrue, Though It Was a Close Call.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Lima, O., March 27.—The banks of the Grand reservoir, 25 miles south of here, the largest artificial body of water in the world broke at 9:20 o'clock this morning. An oil pumping station a quarter of a mile from the bulkhead sent the flash, adding: "Can tell no more. Must run for life."

The town of St. Marys, with a population of 6000, is in danger. The waters will go north to Deatur and Fort Wayne, Ind. towns on the St. Marys river. They have been warned.

### Fort Wayne in Danger.

Fort Wayne, Ind., March 27.—Authentic information that the Grand reservoir has broken through its banks was received here today. A wall of water three and a half to four feet of water is expected here in three hours.

### The Break Is Stopped.

Fort Wayne, Ind., March 27.—After the town of St. Marys had pleaded with Fort Wayne to send boats and men to save its residents, imperiled in the break of the Grand reservoir, the police chief of St. Marys has just telephoned that the residents of the town have closed the break in the reservoir, and now have the situation well in hand.

### ALIENS CANNOT FISH IN ALASKAN WATERS

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Juneau, Alaska, March 27.—Aliens will be barred from fishing in Alaskan waters, if the senate passes the Svindseth bill, which went through the house with a big majority here today. The house also passed the Shoup bill providing for a juvenile court. Organized opposition is being made by the placer miners to the 8-hour bill, as they claim that the season in which they can work is so short that the bill means ruin if it becomes a law. The first Monday in September is set aside as Alaska day.

## HOW JOHNSON STOPPED SON SMOKING CIGARETTES

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Sacramento, Cal., March 27.—How Governor Hiram Johnson was subdued by the "steam roller" and "big sticket" into submission to a principle of which he did not at all approve was told before the assembly public morals committee last night by Grove L. Johnson, his father.

The elder Johnson was opposing Assemblyman Kueck's anti-cigarette bill. He said the place to legislate on this subject was at home, preferably in the woodshed, if one were handy.

"I stopped my boys from being cigarette fiends," said the governor's father. "I think the older son—whom so many of you people like—never smoked one after I decided he could not."

### Against the Workers.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] Seattle, Wash., March 27.—Holding that affiliation with the Industrial Workers of the World is not conducive to good citizenship, Judge A. W. Frater denied naturalization papers to Meyer Goerliek, the tailor, whose discharge by the Vollman company recently precipitated the I. W. W. strike here.

Judge Frater said that the I. W. W. organization "teaches confiscation of property, violation of contracts, revolution and the taking of anything in the easiest way one can get it."

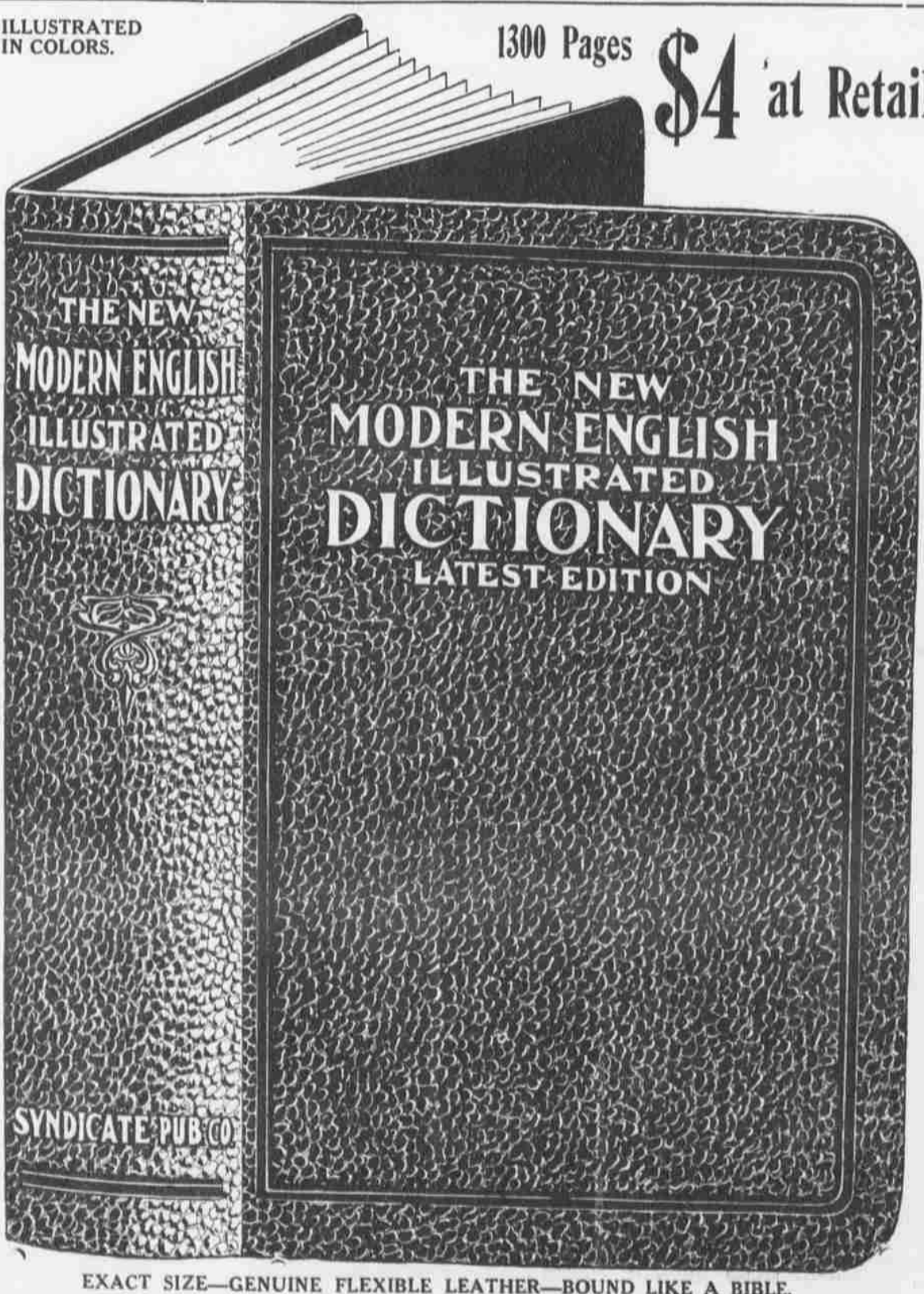
