[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] New York, April 3.—Fritz Augustus Heinze, the Montana copper magnate, a broken man, is enroute to Toledo today with the body of his wife, Mrs. Bernice Henderson Heinze, who recently filed an application for divorce. A reconciliation was effected when Mrs. Heinze was informed that she could not recover from an attack of neuritis. "If I am going to die, please send for Fritz," she said. "I love him still." Heinze came at once. Entering the room, he put his arms about his wife and wept. The nurses and physicians left them alone. "Oh, Fritz, I am so glad—so happy," she said later. Within an hour she died with a smile on her lips, her hand clasped in her husband's hand.

FRENCH AUTHORITIES ARREST GERMAN OFFICERS

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] Lunenburg, France, April 3.—French authorities today seized and detained several German army officers, in full uniform, when they landed on French territory in a disabled Zeppelin airship. The Germans told General Leseault, the French commander, that they left Lake Constance this morning but were forced to alight by a broken propeller blade. General Leseault held the Germans under arrest, despite their protestations of innocence of spying, a move which may result in international complications.

May Go on Strike.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] San Francisco, April 3.—Because of the refusal of the Pacific Gas and Electric company to grant recognition of the recently formed Light and Power council of California, the several unions affiliated with the council today are taking a referendum vote on the question of calling a strike against the corporation. The company has signified a willingness to treat with the individual unions but refuses to deal with the council.

SPECIAL ELECTION PROBABLY JUNE 17

The "Drys" to Circulate Petitions at Once and Present Them to Council Next Monday Night.

Tuesday, June 17, will be the date of the special election on the saloon issue in Salem, if the city council acts favorably upon petitions which will be presented to that body Monday night. This announcement was made this afternoon by William H. Trindle, secretary of the Municipal Improvement League and director of the "dry" camp.

The petitions calling for the election were placed in the hands of the printer this afternoon, and the circulation for the required names will begin either tomorrow or Saturday. For the accommodation of those wishing to sign the petitions, but who are not caught on the streets or at their places of business, the petitions will be taken to the several churches of the city Sunday and those attending given an opportunity to sign their names both after the morning and the evening services.

Legal on Sunday.

There was some question as to whether the petitions could be legally signed on Sunday until the opinion of Attorney General Crawford was obtained this afternoon. The attorney-general assured those making inquiry that names signed on Sunday are entirely acceptable under the law.

Volunteers have already been engaged to take care of the circulation of petitions. The circulators will work in six squads, each in charge of a manager.

It is believed that June 17 will be a convenient date for the election. The first plans made included the setting of the date for the election early in May so that the vote would not be cut down by the absence of persons on vacation outings. Few people leave Salem, however, before July, and it is not thought that the vote will be perceptibly lessened.

MRS. JAMES HUTTON DIES AT WATERLOO

News was received here today of the death of Mrs. James C. Hutton, an Oregon pioneer who settled in the west in the early '50's, and the grandmother of Mrs. Oswald West and Mrs. Ben W. O'cott, of this city.

Mrs. Hutton died last night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. James Harbin, of Waterloo. She was 87 years old and a native of Indiana.

The deceased leaves a son, O. B. Hutton, of Portland, and two grand-daughters, Mrs. West and Mrs. O'cott, both of this city, and a grandson, H. E. Hutton.

The remains will arrive here on the 9:30 Oregon Electric train tomorrow morning, the body being taken directly to the Odd Fellows cemetery.
