CITY NEWS.

Secretary of State Olcott will use one of the rooms adjacent to the senate chamber to take care of the increased business which will result from the new registration law, which becomes effective June 5.

Colon R. Eberhard, retiring receiver of public moneys at the U. S. land office at La Grande, and one of Eastern Oregon's leading attorneys, was in the city this morning, having business at the capitol. Mr. Eberhard was one of the first Taft appointees in Oregon, and has now held more than four years. His future headquarters will be La Grande, where he enters a leading law firm.

The banks must pay two per cent interest on county duty business is the ruling of Attorney-General Crawford today in answer to a question propounded by Treasurer John Frawley of Union county. While the form in the law passed by the recent legislature says 1 per cent shall be charged Crawford's ruling is that the law itself which says in section 2 that the charge shall be 2 per cent holds.

Attorney-General Crawford today held in an opinion that a man sent to the penitentiary December 14, 1901, from Portland, to serve three years for burglary, and who December 3, 1902, was transferred to the asylum for the insane, but now go back to prison to complete his term, having recently become sane. The attorney-general holds that the long term in the asylum does not constitute punishment within the meaning of the law.

Beginning next Wednesday seed for the popcorn contest for the students of the Marion county schools will be ready for distribution from the Capital National bank, in Salem. Each package will contain about 1000 kernels, and the contestants must agree to plant the seed on ground with an area of not more than 1000 square feet, and exhibit the product at the state fair here in the third week of September.

A peculiar meeting took place at the Hotel Marion last Saturday, when Kola Neis, of this city, and Paul Derehmann, a member of the "Merry Widow" orchestra, chanced to become acquainted, and, after a short conversation, it was found that Mr. Neis crossed the waters recently on the same steamer on which Mr. Derehmann's wife took passage. Both gentlemen were unacquainted when they opened conversation, and not until Mr. Neis mentioned that he had just returned from Europe, and the name of the steamer he arrived on, did Mr. Derehmann locate a friend of his wife in the far west. Mrs. Derehmann is now in New York.

AUGUST HUCKESTEEN TO BE POSTMASTER

Both Senators Unite in Recommending Him Which Makes His Appointment Certain.

A dispatch from Washington Saturday states that the Oregon senators have agreed upon August Huckestein as postmaster at Salem and have united in recommending him for the place. This is practically the same as his appointment and Mr. Huckestein's appointment is assured. His chief opponents for the place were Tom B. Wilson and James E. Godfrey. His name will probably be sent to the senate within a few days.

Pipe Organ Recital and Concert.

There has been installed in the Catholic church, of this city, a pipe organ manufactured by Mr. Emmons Howard, of Westfield, Massachusetts. This organ was made in accordance with a special order of the donor of the instrument, Mr. Howard is a well-known manufacturer of pipe organs of the United States, having been awarded gold medals for the efficiency of the make of his organs. Mr. Howard furnished the Presbyterian church of this city with a pipe organ about one year ago. He has been here for the past two weeks, superintending the placing of the organ in the Catholic church. It is a very superior organ, and the tone of it is of an excellent character. A concert will be given next Friday, April 25th, under the supervision of Prof. F. W. Goodrich, of Portland, assisted by several vocalists. The musical lovers of our city will have an opportunity of listening to one of the best concerts that has been held here in recent years.

THE ROUND-UP

Stayton had a fine horse show and a big crowd Saturday, and some of the finest horses in the state, too.

West Stayton has started a cannery. It will handle tomatoes, beans and berries this season as a starter.

A blaze starting in a smoke house of the Stayton meat market last Tuesday afternoon for a while threatened the whole block, but due to the splendid work of the volunteer fire company, it was gotten under control. The damage was nominal.

The Southern Pacific has concluded to locate its shops at Springfield, and has brought suit to condemn 42 acres of land for the purpose.

Silverton will hold a fruit poultry and education fair October 24-25. Prizes will be in two classes, one for young folks under 12 years of age, the other those between 12 and 21.

James Cann, aged 84, died at Albany Thursday last. He had been in Oregon for 40 years, coming here from Ohio.

The largest shipment of poles ever to leave Cottage Grove will be made when the Burkholder-Woods Co. makes shipment of an order received this week from California. The order is for forty double loads, 80 cars being required in handling the shipment. The poles are to be 130 to 140 feet in length, thus taking two cars for each load.
