CITY OF SALEM IS UPHOLD BY COURT

Asylum Employees Had Right to Vote and Glen Oaks Addition was Legally Part of the City.

The supreme court held today that the city of Salem acted legally in extending its boundaries in 1910 to include, with other property, lots 17 and 21, block 2, Glen Oak addition, which includes the Oregon asylum for the insane. It was contended that the vote of 42 employees of the asylum were cast illegally, but the court holds that they are legally qualified. It was also contended that property was not the kind that should be annexed, all but a small portion being vested in the state of Oregon. The court holds that inasmuch as the rights of the state were not invaded this contention does not hold good.

believe that the matter should come up at a regular election.

Unwise to Proceed.

Fourth—We believe that until such time as we have sold the bonds now authorized and the refund of the money is well under way that it would be unwise to proceed with any further bond issues or the incurring of any further bonded indebtedness.

Fifth—Inasmuch as it is a certainty that the 10-mill tax levy authorized by the charter would have to be increased by at least a mill and a half or even two mills to do any great amount of good, that such movement for the increase in the taxing limits should originate with the people who desire the expenditures made, rather than in this council.

The foregoing are our conclusions and based upon them and other reasons which it is needless to go into at this time we wish to recommend to the council that resolution No. 1097, directing the city attorney to prepare the necessary ordinance ordering a special election, be not adopted, and that its further consideration be indefinitely postponed. We further recommend along the lines of our report that the people who have been assessed for lateral sewer districts and have paid the same, or upon whose land a cloud now rests by reason of the lien of such assessments, prepare and circulate a petition to this council asking for the submission of the question of a bond issue of not less than \$125,000 for the purposes asked in this resolution, which measure should provide for the vote upon the same at the regular election December 1, 1913, before which time we believe that the refunds proposed be made under the bond issue now authorized, will be well out of the way and the situation very much more thoroughly understood by the public at large. enable piece of carelessness and incompetency.

The fundamental purpose and ground for changing the method under which the city had been proceeding for two years or more in the construction of its sewers by special assessment against the property benefitted, was because the city as it had existed prior to 1903 constituting the territory lying between North Mill creek and Mission street had constructed its main sewers and possibly some of its laterals, at the expense of the general public and that after 1903 property lying in both North and South Salem had been compelled to contribute by general taxation to the payment of both principal and interest on outstanding bonded indebtedness originally issued for construction of the said sewers within the old corporate limits above described. It appears, therefore, perfectly clear to us that when the advocates of this recent charter amendment and bond ordinance omitted or neglected to provide for the lateral sewer assessments actually levied prior to the election and to provide funds for sewerage these parts of the city which were then under contract or about to be contracted, that they did an injustice infinitely greater than the one that they were seeking to redress by the election of December 2, 1912, measured in terms of dollars and cents and considered from the standpoint of consistency and honesty of purpose, in our opinion the very principle which the most active advocates of these measures were contending for was either utterly lost sight of or else deliberately and shamefully ignored.

Wrong to Interfere.

Your committee believes that it is wrong for this council to at this time interfere in the solution of this sewer problem of the city by ordering a special election, for several reasons, which are all founded more or less upon the facts recited in this report which may be summarized briefly as follows:

First—The three preceding councils which have dealt painstakingly with the sewer problems of this city have almost unanimously, we believe, regarded the bonding of the city at large for the construction of sewers as a mistake of policy. The members of this committee, who were also members of the council which was in office when the said initiative petitions were presented and declined to vote for the issuance of bonds on the ground that the solution offered by the measure presented was not a just and fair solution to all of the people, very largely by reason of the facts pointed out in this report, and therefore did their duty by submitting the petition to an election without any opposition measure advocating their views.

Second—The opinion of this committee is not changed from what it was at the time the measures were initiated, and we believe that a majority of this council are likewise of the same opinion, and because we believe that a mistake was made and a wrong perpetrated upon a part of the people, we feel that we should ask that the election upon this question should come, not from us, but from the people who have done the wrong and made the mistake.

Third—We are opposed to incurring the expense of a special election and

er projects without submitting the specific sewerage plan or district proposed to be drained to a vote of the people.

After considering the matter in its various aspects both upon the facts as set forth in the said resolution and from our thoughtful consideration and study of the matter extending over a period of a year or more, your committee is convinced that the people should vote bonds to give relief to the people situated as recited in the said resolution and in this report, at an early date, provided it is the desire of a majority of the people to adhere to the method of paying for sewers adopted at the election on December 2, 1912, which was a change from the method adopted by the two councils which considered the North and South Salem sewer projects.

We have carefully considered the effect of ordering an election and what it would be necessary to do in the way of raising money to meet an additional bond issue over and above the present indebtedness and operating expense of the city and that actually authorized and in process of being floated for sewers, to the extent of about \$350,000 at the present time, and we are absolutely certain that the limit of taxation fixed by the charter, at 10 mills, would not by any possibility raise sufficient revenue to run the city and take care of this additional proposed issue of bonds, and it would be therefore absolutely necessary to raise the taxation limit above 10 mills, which limit is now fixed by the city charter.

Imperfectly Understood.

We are also convinced from our contact with many people since the election in December, 1912, that the vote recorded at that election was the result of a very imperfect understanding of the scope and effect of the charter amendment and bond ordinance then carried. Many people have told us that they thought and believed that the lateral sewers were being provided for in the bond issue, and in order to satisfy ourselves that we were not in error about the impression then prevailing we have gone back over the files of the newspapers and find that The Capital Journal, particularly, in its issue after issue, stated and claimed that the lateral sewers in North Salem were being provided for, while we found an article published in the Statesman in the form of an opinion from the city attorney, to the effect that the laterals were not included, which opinion was reiterated at the special instance of a man by the name of Neer, a resident of North Salem, that nevertheless, the general impression prevailed that these sewers were included, and we are strongly of the opinion that the omission to provide for refunding said lateral sewer assessments was undoubtedly done knowingly by the person who prepared and submitted to the people the charter amendment and bond ordinance, otherwise these persons who prepared and circulated the petitions stand convicted by the record of their actions, of a mis-



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


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
