MONTENEGRO WILL ABANDON SCUTARI

Think This Will Be Done Within 24 Hours—Albanian Officials Are Assassinated.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] Berlin, May 5.—Assassination of the Albanian provisional ministers of public works and of justice at Avlona, is reported here today in dispatches from Brindisi. The victims were members of the republican government of Ismail Kemal Bey. It is reported the assassins were soldiers from the force of Djavid Pasha.

When Montenegro informed the German foreign office today of its intention to evacuate Scutari no intimation was made that any concessions are to be exacted in return from the powers. No advices have been received here that Montenegro has actually withdrawn her troops, but it is expected the evacuation will be effected within 24 hours. It is regarded as barely possible that some hitch may yet occur, although to date no evidence of any ulterior design by Montenegro has appeared.

Their Case Continued.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] San Francisco, May 5.—The trials of F. Drew Caminetti and Maury I. Sigg, charged with the violation of the Mann white slave act, in taking Lola Norris and Marsha Warrington, two Sacramento society girls, to Reno for immoral purposes, was continued here today for two weeks in the United States district court, upon the request of United States District Attorney McNab, who said in court he was asking the delay in response to a telephone conversation with State Senator Caminetti, father of one of the accused men. McNab said the senator wished to confer with him before the cases came to trial.

The cases of Diggs and his attorney, C. R. Harris, of Sacramento, charged with conspiracy to suborn perjury, as an outgrowth of the white slave case, went over for one week.

MILLIONAIRE STILL DODGES THE COURT

Fifteen-Year-Old Girl Gives Testimony in Vice Case at Los Angeles This Morning.

[UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE] Los Angeles, Cal., May 5.—Fifteen-year-old Evelyn Quick, said to be the prettiest of the score of girl witnesses called in connection with the various phases of the white slave investigation in progress here, testified today at the preliminary hearing of William LaCasse, charged with contributing to her delinquency.

"Mr. LaCasse was introduced to me by Mr. Hollingsworth at the Vernon Country Club," the girl testified in a low, musical voice. Richard Hollingsworth is another man charged with contributing to her delinquency. "On January 26 I went to Pasadena, early in the morning, with him and another woman. We came back to Mr. Hollingsworth's apartments, and afterwards had dinner at Levy's with Mr. LaCasse and Mr. Hollingsworth. Later I went to Mr. LaCasse's bungalow in Mr. Hollingsworth's machine, and I stayed there until late. We were alone all evening.

"In February my sister came to Mr. LaCasse's home when we were there. Mr. LaCasse had on his pajamas. I went my sister to buy some ice cream, and while she was gone he dressed. When I went away he slipped \$10 in my pocket."

The hear set for George H. Bixby to enter pleas to charges of contributing to the delinquency of two girls was changed from early today until late this afternoon. It was expected that Bixby's attorney, Oscar Lawler, would move to have the indictments against his client quashed.

THE COURT REDUCES THEIR SENTENCES

Gompers Must Serve 30 Days in Jail and the Others Pay a Fine of \$500 Each.

Washington, May 5.—Contempt charges against Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor; John Mitchell, its vice-president, and Frank Morrison, its secretary, were upheld here today by the district court of appeals. It held that Gompers should serve 30 days in jail, and that Mitchell and Morrison should pay \$500 fines.

The cases arose out of criticism of Judge Daniel Thew Wright, as an outcome of the famous boycott against the Duks Stove Company, of St. Louis.

Justice Wright originally sentenced Gompers, Mitchell and Morrison to one year, nine months and six months, respectively.

Justice VanOrsdall and Robb, of the court of appeals, held these sentences were excessive and modified them, providing that Gompers only should suffer imprisonment, and the others should be fined. The sentence provides that Gompers shall be confined in the Washington asylum jail.

Justice Sheppard dissented from the finding of Robb and VanOrsdall, holding that the whole proceedings should be reversed.

Counsel for the three defendants probably will now appeal to the United States supreme court, but late this afternoon they had not finished reading the lengthy opinion of the district court of appeals.
