The ordinance committee reported unfavorably on the proposition, declaring that the police could take care of the mischievous boys under the present ordinances.

Councilman Macy made the statement that if the councilmen lived in a community where boys throw stones, they would be more favorable to the ordinance.

BILL REGULATING POOLROOMS PASSED

Clause Providing for Sunday Closing Is Eliminated and Places Must Close at Midnight.

The ordinance regulating pool and billiard halls was amended last night by the city council to eliminate the clause providing for Sunday closing. The amendment was made when the council was in committee of the whole, Councilman Macy presiding. The ordinance as amended, was afterward passed by a vote of 9 to 4, the vote being:

For—Brown, Hatch, Macy, Siegmund, Skafie, Southwick, Stolz, Turner and Waring.

Against—Constable, Cummings, Jones and Minton.

As passed the ordinance provides that pool and billiard rooms shall be closed between 12 p. m. and 6 a. m.

Councilman Turner, who moved the amendments, denounced the Sunday closing as class legislation. He believed it to be unconstitutional and said the courts had so decided. He could not understand why some people should seek privileges and deny them to others. A good many people work 10 to 12 hours a day during the week and on Sunday have a chance to play pool. As long as people were allowed other Sunday privileges, such as going to church and motoring, the councilman could not see why the pool and billiard rooms should be closed.

RECALL ORDINANCE COMES UP MONDAY

Amendments Are Adopted and Copy of Engrossed Bill Will Be Given Members Tomorrow.

The recall ordinance was reported by the ordinance committee at last evening's meeting of the city council and the amendments proposed were adopted. The final vote on the bill was put over to next Monday in order that the bill as amended, might be engrossed and each member furnished with a copy tomorrow. The motion was made by Councilman Brown, who stated that he believed all the councilmen should know the terms of the ordinance before a vote was taken.

The most important amendment is that requiring a petition with 25 per cent of the total vote cast in a ward, instead of 25 per cent of the vote cast for the candidate, to start recall proceedings.

Councilman Brown said he was favorable to the bill.

Notice to Property Owners.

The common council desires to call the attention of all property owners to the provision of ordinance No. 527, relating to the laying of water and gas mains and service pipes, section 2 of said ordinance provides: "That all mains used in the city of Salem, Oregon, for conveying water or gas or for other purposes along streets which are permanently improved or to be permanently improved shall immediately be for such improvement is made, be laid in such streets in a permanent manner."

Section 3 provides: "All service pipes attached to mains shall not be less than one inch internal diameter and all pipes of less diameter shall be removed and immediately replaced with pipes in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, and the same shall also be provided with curb cock and iron shut-off box and cover and shall be placed sixteen (16) inches inside of the curb line; provided, however, that this section shall not be enforced on streets not having permanent improvement."

The council urges all property owners owning property upon streets proposed to be improved in 1913 to immediately attend to the proper installation of water, gas and sewer pipes serving their property, whether the property has buildings thereon or may be vacant. This co-operation upon the part of the property owners is necessary to a prompt and satisfactory completion of the pavement projects under way at the present time.

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient and hereby declares its intention to forthwith improve Union street from the east line of Water street to the west line of Twelfth street, in the city of Salem, Oregon, with one-course, six-inch crushed gravel cement concrete pavement at the expense of the abutting property within the said limits in accordance with the plans and specifications for said street improvement, as heretofore adopted by the common council of said city and on file in the

office of the city recorder, which are hereby referred to for a detailed description of said improvement and made part of this notice by such reference.

Written remonstrance against the said proposed pavement may be made at any time within ten (10) days from the final publication of this notice in the manner provided by the city charter. OREGON STATE INSANE ASYLUM Notice to Contractors.

Sealed proposals for the furnishing of labor and material required for the full completion of five separate and distinct buildings (aggregating in cost about \$30,000) to be erected at the Asylum Farm, located about five miles southeast of the city of Salem, Oregon, will be opened by the board of trustees in the governor's office at 2 p. m., Thursday, May 8th, 1913, at the state capitol building, Salem.

Plans and specifications may be obtained at the office of W. C. Knighton, architect, capitol building, Salem. Contractors will be required to deposit \$25 for the five sets of plans as a guarantee that the plans and specifications received by them will be returned to the architect in good condition on or before the date set for opening of bids. On return of the five sets of drawings and specifications the money will be refunded.

A certified check for \$2000 must accompany proposal and drawn to the order of Ralph A. Watson clerk of the board of trustees to guarantee that bidder will enter into a contract and execute the required bond; same shall be forfeited to the state of Oregon if award of contract is made to bidder and he or they fail to enter into a contract and furnish the required bond within ten (10) days from date of award of contract.

Proposals shall be made only on form furnished by the architect. The right is reserved to accept or reject any or all bids or to waive any informalities in bids.
