THE BABY SAW THE WHOLE TRAGEDY

Saw His Father Kill His Mother and Then Himself—A Pitiful Story From Oakland.

[UNITED PRESS LEASING WIRE.] Oakland, Cal., May 9.—Playing at the side of his mother in the bedroom of the family home here early today, 3-year-old Robert Craig watched his father, Benjamin Craig, write his last will and testament and then turn a gun on his wife, driving a bullet into her right temple as she slept. The husband fired a second shot into his own head, dying instantly. Mrs. Craig, about to become a mother, is probably fatally wounded. Ill health of the man is assigned as the cause of the tragedy. In the will Craig bequeathed his property to Mrs. W. E. Field, mother of Mrs. Craig. He asked Mrs. Field to place his little son in some public home for children.

The child tried to awaken his mother following the shooting and was smothered with blood when he ran into the hallway and aroused the other occupants of the house.

Craig was for many years an employe of the Southern Pacific in the buffet service on the ferry boats. He recently returned from Los Angeles, where he went in a vain endeavor to recover his health.

TERRIBLE TRAGEDY ON MONTANA FARM

[UNITED PRESS LEASING WIRE.] Missoula, Mont., May 9.—With four bullets in her body, and nearly dead from loss of blood, Mrs. H. A. Wellington is dying here today, after telling a story of death and wounds almost unparalleled in Montana.

Shot through the hands, chest and neck, Mrs. Wellington dragged herself three-quarters of a mile to the home of a neighbor on the Flathead reservation, and, almost fainting, told of the murder of her husband, H. A. Wellington, the serious wounding of a boy named Cooke, and the suicide of their assistant, a stranger named Stansky, on the lonely ranch.

Stansky, the woman said, arrived at their home late yesterday. He said he came from Wisconsin. Mrs. Wellington declared the attack was unprovoked. Officers have left here for the scene of the tragedy.

Japan's Protest Fled. [UNITED PRESS LEASING WIRE.] Washington, May 9.—Japan's formal protest against the California anti-alien land law was presented to the United States government here today. It was handed to Secretary of State Bryan by Viscount Chinda, the Japanese ambassador.

Bryan laid the matter before the cabinet, later chatting briefly with Chinda and arranging for another conference tomorrow.

The White House is silent regarding the contents of Japan's protest. The fact that Secretary Bryan left for New York this afternoon to speak at a banquet there tonight indicates that the situation is not considered serious.

"Ambassador Chinda and I conferred informally," said Secretary Bryan. "I cannot discuss the meeting."

Has New Cabinet. [UNITED PRESS LEASING WIRE.] Cottinje, May 9.—The new Montenegro cabinet was sworn in here this afternoon. The new ministry replaces that which resigned when King Nicholas announced his intention to surrender Sautari to the powers.
