PLANT AN ACRE TO FLAX.

The Capital Journal invites public discussion in this department—Let both sides of all matters be fully brought out—It is not the purpose of this newspaper to do the thinking for its readers.
 Once More, the Jap.
 Editor Capital Journal:
 Since you ask me a few questions, I venture another article on the Jap. You want my authority for the statement that the anti-Jap league had its headquarters in San Francisco. My statement was based upon a United Press report, to the effect that a lobbyist at the capital sent to the league headquarters for a list of the legislators who had signed the pledge.
 In question form your say, in effect, that "the San Francisco Jap league could not nominate or elect the legislators from the farming districts, nor could it influence the farmers' vote." But this league did get pre-election pledges from the candidates of the three leading parties, and set them howling to the farmers, and bidding against each other for votes. Public opinion, without political stimulus, did not promise sufficient for the league's purpose. It was largely a worked-up frenzy, the politicians beating the tom-toms, and the "Native Sons" shouting forth their inherent right to special consideration in the struggle for gain. You ask why I want this country owned by Japs?
 The California Jap owns one acre

for every 7900 acres in the state. This shows how he is gobbling up California. The Jap has helped to develop the state, pays taxes, buys tools and machinery and sells in the markets just like other men, is as moral as the average, obeys the laws like his white neighbor; but, being more industrious and economical than the "native-born," he is hated and denounced.
 It was the United States that forced open the ports of Japan, sent our war fleet into her harbors and compelled her to make a treaty with us. To discriminate now against her citizens is sneaking and mean to the limit.
