

## BIG JAPS COMING TO LEARN THE CAUSE

They Want to Know Why Japs Are Not Wanted—As They Know They Are Fine People.

San Francisco, May 19.—Bearing as its most conspicuous passengers two members of the Japanese parliament, who come to California to probe the reason for anti-alien legislation, the Orient liner Korea docked here today.

The two Japanese ambassadors de facto are Soruko Ebara, a member of the constitutional party in the Japanese diet, and Iohiso Hattori, a member of the Japanese house of peers. The eagerness of the two envoys to learn the status of affairs in California was indicated by their sending a wireless message before the Korea reached port, inquiring if Governor Johnson had yet signed the anti-alien land bill.

The two commissioners will visit all

the large Japanese colonies in the state to study conditions which have caused the anti-alien legislation.

### The Hottest Stars.

The temperature of seventy stars have been calculated by Dr. H. Rowenberg, a German astronomer, from comparisons of the differences of intensity in different portions of the sun's spectrum. One star, Gamma Pegasi, seems to have the inconceivable heat of more than 400,000 degrees C. The next is much cooler, Gamma Cassiopeia, at 50,000 degrees, but this is vastly hotter than Alpha Tauri, the coolest, at 2,150 degrees. By the same scale of computation the temperature of our sun is found to be 4,950 degrees. The hottest stars are the helium stars and those showing bright hydrogen lines in their spectra.

### Voices of Maine and Virginia.

Commenting on the manner of speech in different parts of this country, Arthur E. Bostwick in "The Different West" has this to say:

"The pleasantest qualities of voice that we have are to be found in Maine and Virginia—slow and distinct in enunciation, sweet in intonation. ### The Wake of a Ship.

"Wake" for the track of a ship is a Scandinavian word, preserved in dialect. Its original meaning, as Professor Skeats tells us, was that of an opening in the ice, especially the passage cut for a ship in a frozen lake or sea, and then, from being applied to the smooth, watery track left by a ship after its passage through the ice, it came to be used when there was no ice at all. This useful word is one of the nautical terms which the French have borrowed from the English, although it is not easy to recognize it at first in its French form of "ouïsche," and it is still used on the Norfolk broads with its original meaning of an open place in the ice.

### Notice of Proposed Re-Establishment and Change of Grade on Fairmount Avenue from Lincoln Street to Superior Street.

Notice to the public is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, proposes to re-establish and change the official grade of Fairmount avenue between the intersection of the center lines of Fairmount Avenue and Lincoln street and the intersection of the center lines of Fairmount Avenue and Superior street.

The grades which are proposed to be established by the common council are described as follows:

At the intersection of the center lines of Fairmount Avenue and Lincoln streets, at an elevation of 201.3 feet above said base of grades.

At the intersection of the center lines of Fairmount Avenue and Washington street, at an elevation of 215.5 feet above said base of grades.

At the intersection of the center lines of Fairmount Avenue and Superior street, at an elevation of 232.0 feet above said base of grades.

All persons owning property adjacent to said Fairmount Avenue or the part thereof described above and upon which it is proposed to re-establish and change the grade, are hereby notified to make and file their written remonstrance with the city recorder, if any they have, against the said proposed re-establishment and change of grade within the period of ten (10) days from the final publication of this notice, and unless the owners of more than two-thirds majority of the superficial area of the property adjacent to said Fairmount Avenue or the part thereof particularly affected by said proposed re-establishment or change of grade, remonstrate in the manner provided by the charter of the city of Salem, Oregon, within the period above named, the common council will proceed to re-establish and change the grade of said Fairmount Avenue, as above set forth by the passage of an ordinance on or after twenty (20) days from the date of the first publication of this notice.
